#### **Church Roof Repair Update**

The repairs to the Church roof have being going well. By the time you read this they should be almost complete. One or two delays due to weather have been encountered, but at the time of writing we are only about 1 week behind schedule.

A few pieces of work that were not originally planned for have been identified, but in general we should be close to our original budget of about £105,000. Unfortunately once the scaffolding is down it will be difficult to see the results of all the hard work apart from there being no rain coming into the building and a new ladder on the tower to give access to the nave roof to allow the clearing of the gutters.

We would like to thank **Graham Cook**, the architect and project manager for the job and the specialist contractors **Warren & Neale** who are based in Leicester.

Thanks also go to the two organisations who funded most of the project. These are **The Listed Places of Worship Roof Repair Fund** who awarded us just over £90,000 and **Lincolnshire Churches Trust** who gave £5,000 towards the work.

We would also Like to thank all those who have organised and supported events at the Church which have raised the much needed additional funds to allow the project to go ahead.

Hopefully the work done will allow the building to survive for a few hundred more years.

There is always still plenty of work to do to maintain the building and it's surroundings so please come along and use the facilities and support the forthcoming events organised by the Friends of Wigtoft Church to help raise funds for future projects.

#### **Topical Talk**

It was interesting to read recently about the find made by the Illman family – they live in Perth, Australia and were on holiday about 100 miles north of their home. They were on a beach near Wedge Island when they saw an object half buried in the sand. On closer examination it turned out to be an old bottle: inside the bottle was what appeared to be a large, rolled-up cigarette. When they opened the bottle and took out the contents it turned out to be a written message. Now, messages in bottles are quite a common thing – hundreds must be thrown into the sea in a year, but the surprise here was that it was thrown into the water on June  $12^{\text{th}}$  1886 – 132 years earlier. It had been thrown into the Indian Ocean from the German sailing ship Paula and had been deliberately thrown overboard here as part of an experiment to check ocean currents; this was one of several thousand used in this way and the message asked the finder to contact the German Consulate when they found the note.

Mrs Illman said that she had picked the bottle up because it looked interesting and she thought that it would be nice stood in her bookcase. The Illmans took the bottle to the Western Australian Museum where Russ Anderson, the assistant curator of maritime archaeology, identified it as a mid-to-late  $19^{\rm th}$  century gin bottle. He contacted colleagues in Germany and was surprised to learn that the date the bottle was tossed into the Indian Ocean, June  $12^{\rm th}$  1886 was entered by the captain in the ship's log. The bottle is now on display in the Western Australian Museum.

Still in Australia – the wreck of the USS aircraft carrier Lexington has been located – it was found, two miles down, 500 miles off the Queensland coast. This vessel has been credited with having helped to save Australia from Japanese invasion. She was lost in an epic naval battle in 1942, the ship was crippled in May of that year during the Battle of the Coral Sea, when waves of Japanese planes bombed her and she was also hit by torpedoes.

The battle was fought mainly by two Japanese carriers and two US carriers: the Lexington lost 216 men in the battle but the remaining crew of 2,735 were saved; the badly crippled carrier was eventually scuppered by another US warship, the USS Phelps.

This battle is regarded as a turning point in the war, breaking the momentum of the Japanese advance towards Australia.

Admiral Harry Harris, the current US Pacific commander, said that, as the son of a survivor of the Lexington, he was elated by the find.

The name of Christmas Island won't mean much to most people – it's just a small island in the Indian Ocean, administered by Australia. To a few people, mostly elderly, it will bring back memories of the 1950's and nuclear and hydrogen

bomb testing by the UK.

These tests were carried out by the UK on this remote island at a time when the cold war was at its height and there was a real threat to people in the West from Russia.

One of the people who witnessed these tests was Doug Hern: he was a National Serviceman and was a cook on board one of the ships taking part in the series of tests. When the explosions took place many of these young men were only a few miles away from the test site and were just told to close their eyes.

There have been many reports over the past 60 years or so about the effects to these young men from being so close to this radiation: Doug himself has had health issues and has lost a daughter to cancer. He is just part of the charitable group that has been campaigning for many years for justice to compensate these people for their health problems that they claim stem directly from the radiation they endured at this time.

Doug lives at Moulton – he attended Cowley's School at Donington in the late 1940's and early 1950's and there are quite a few local people who went to school with him.

Both Doug and his wife Sandie are members of the British Nuclear Test Veterans Association – this charity has managed to obtain £25 million from the government for an Aged Veteran Fund to alleviate suffering and increase well-being for these veterans .

The snow and ice has melted and the gorgeous white snowdrops have reappeared signalling the start of spring. Winter gardens have been attracting visitors to see masses of stunning snowdrops. Year after year viewers turn up as the tiny flowers announce that winter doesn't last for ever.

There are many varieties of snowdrop, scientific name Galanthus, and if we examine the double and single flowers carefully we will notice the differences in markings and shapes. Some were in flower at Christmas, others are still in bloom in March.

Snowdrops love woodland and will spread naturally around the base of most trees. Snowdrop Sunday fell on February 12<sup>th</sup> and many churches and stately homes served afternoon tea to visitors. Snowdrops are often inter-planted with aconites which flower even earlier in the year. Potted bulbs can be brought indoors to brighten the dullest of days and will be happy to return to the great out of doors after flowering.

At Whisby Nature Park families may plant snowdrops in a grassy area, in memory of someone special who has died. After planting you can walk around the area and perhaps meet others who have been in a similar situation.

"February Fairmaids" or snowdrops have enriched our loves once more in great clumps as well as solitary sweetness .

#### Sam Snail's Jobs In The Garden

The garden is starting to emerge again after the heavy snowfall, it amazed me that snowdrops and crocus flowers are still standing up after all that weight on them.

This is the time to prune Buddleia Davidii usually grown to attract butterflies and insects. Shorten them to two or three pairs of healthy leaf buds as they flower on this years' growth. Take last year's flowers from Hydrangeas down to the first pair of leaves below the flowers. If the shrub is overgrown take them back further and remove any damage.

If you grow from seeds, plant sweet peas into toilet roll centres or half kitchen rolls. Stand them in a tray or pots with one or two seeds on top of the compost filling them and cover with ¼ inch soil. When you plant them out the cardboard holds the roots and makes for a more successful outcome.

Plant tomato, pepper and chilli seeds, keep them at about 20 degrees in a propagator or on a warm window sill until germinated, then pot on and keep at about 16 degrees.

Pollard Eucalyptus trees if grown for its' foliage as the new growth has smaller and much more silvery leaves.

If you see potted miniature daffs, such as Tete-a-Tete being sold cheaply it is worth buying and planting them as that is most successful for growing and flowering the following year.

Lets' hope it soon warms up, and a happy Easter to you all.


#### Lincoln Cathedral - Part 4

#### The Lincoln Imp

One of the stone carvings within the cathedral is the Lincoln Imp. There are several variations of the legend surrounding this figure. One, from the 14<sup>th</sup> century says that two mischievous imps were sent by Satan to do evil on Earth. After causing mayhem elsewhere in Northern England the two headed to Lincoln Cathedral where they smashed tables and chairs and tripped up the Bishop. An angel

appeared in the Angel Choir and ordered them to stop. One of the imps sat on top of a stone pillar and started throwing rocks at the angel whilst the other cowered under the broken furniture. The angel turned the first imp into stone but allowed the second to escape. The one that was turned to stone can still be found sitting on top of his stone column in the Angel Choir.

In more recent times the Imp became widely known as a good luck charm after King Edward V111, when Prince of Wales, had been presented with a gold imp scarf pin which



The use of this figure is very widespread both across England and Scotland and it has been speculated that the form is a widespread image which predates its use at Lincoln and was simply an everyday deity that was included during the construction of the cathedral. The image is used by the Lincoln football team, who are known as The Imps.

#### The Library

The medieval library was built in 1422 and consisted of a collection of manuscripts that were kept in a chest or cupboard, and scholars travelled great distances to consult them. By 1422 a new library had been built within the cathedral. Three of the medieval reading desks and one bench survive to this day. It was built to accommodate around 100 manuscripts.





A man by the name of Michael Honywood was made Dean of Lincoln after the Civil War, on the restoration of the Monarchy in 1660. He was given the huge task of repairing the fabric of the church which had been ravaged by the war. By 1674, having done a great deal in bringing the cathedral back to its former glory, he was able to turn his attention to the library. He put up £780 of his own money to build a new library on the site of the ruined north cloister. He commissioned Sir Christopher Wren, a notable architect, to do the design – he also supervised the project throughout. On its completion he bequeathed his own 5,000 books to the library, which included a rare copy of Chaucer's Canterbury Tales.

The priceless collection of books within the library today includes around 100 books printed before 1501. The collection also includes the text of the Venerable Bede.

#### The Rose Windows

These are two enormous round windows within the cathedral – one is known as the "Dean's Eye" and the other as the "Bishop's Eye". The Dean's eye faces north to "protect against the devil" while the Bishop's eye faces south to "receive the Holy Spirit".

The Dean's eye survives from the original structure of the building whilst the bishops eye was probably re-built around 1325-1350 These two windows are highly unusual features in medieval churches and, together with other windows in the cathedral, they make up the third most important collection of medieval glass in an English cathedral after Canterbury and York.

#### **Local Worthies**

#### Francis Meres (1566-1647)

Francis Meres was an English Churchman and author, born at Kirton (Lincs). He was educated at Cambridge and received a BA in 1587, in 1591 he gained his MA.

In 1593 he became an MA of Oxford, so he was a highly educated man. His relative, John Meres, was High Sheriff of Lincolnshire in 1596.

Francis became rector of Wing in Rutland in 1602 where he also ran a school. Both his son Francis and his grandson Edward received their BA and MA from Cambridge and became rectors.

His wife's name was Mary (1576-1631) and their son was born in 1607. He is best known as an author for his book called "Palladis Tamia", or more commonly called "Wit's Treasury". Meres lived at the same time as William Shakespeare and this book is valuable to people who study Shakespeare because it gives a critical account of many of the Bard's works – some have even suggested that possibly some of these works were written by Meres himself. The book also contains valuable information on other English poets of the time.

There is no information as to whereabouts he was born in Kirton but he must have come from a rather wealthy family to have received a Cambridge education. It can be argued that he came from either a local land owning family or perhaps a trading or merchant background, Kirton being close to the port of Boston which was a wealthy trading port at the time.

Another point of interest is his surname of Meres – there is a part of Kirton parish that is known as Kirton Meres: he may have connections here, or this may just be coincidence – a mere, according to the dictionary, is a pool or pond; this area of Lincolnshire, before drainage took place, was very swampy and marshy, so this could explain the name also.

Meres was one year younger than Shakespeare.

He died in Wing, Rutland in 1647.




