The pea is a leguminous plant, mostly annual with climbing stems. The stems have strong tendrils for support as they grow. The flowers are white or coloured and are followed by seeds enclosed in pods. Some varieties are cultivated for the seeds, which are edible, and others for their colourful and sweet scented bloom. Seeds of this plant are usually cooked while still green and tender. Dried peas, with the outer skins removed, are delicious in soups and stews. I remember when drying peas was the only way to preserve them. The phrase 'as like as two peas in a pod' means all peas are alike.



Field peas preceded the garden pea. Pickers were paid by the sack and I enjoyed checking the weight of the bags and paying the workers. It was a pleasant job if the weather was fine. Buyers liked to check the crops and would leave a trail of empty pods, for the peas are best when freshly picked. Growers could never resist the childlike pleasure of sampling the pods from the parent plants. Now peas are frozen within hours of being harvested and the frozen packs are as good as fresh peas.

The Romans cooked peas, when they were hard and dry, in soups and with meat and vegetables. The British made savoury porridge known as pease pudding.

Peas are good for the land and add nitrogen to the soil. The Americans call them 'English peas'. Our diet would be poor without them; fish, chips and peas are enjoyed by all and shepherd's pie would be colourless without them. Raw peas must always be used in salads.

Sometimes peas are grown under plastic to protect them from frost. Wood pigeons enjoy juicy peas so bird scares are really necessary.

How are we meant to eat our peas? Etiquette demands that we should spear or squash them onto our forks but we have all suffered when guiding them to our mouths. Inevitably one or two jump from our plate and cause acute embarrassment.

We must not forget the delicate perfume and beautiful colours of the sweet peas which are grown in our gardens. I have everlasting sweet peas which are hardy perennials. These only come in shades of pink, lilac and magenta. They lack the perfume of the annual sweet pea but the blooms last a very long time and the seeds are often self sown.

Topical Talk

I have been having "fun" again insuring my car. I had a renewal quote from my current insurer and was informed that it was their best competitive quote – it had increased by £106 over the previous year. I rang another company and got a quote with the same conditions; they had sent me information through the post saying that they would give me a 10% discount as I had our house and contents insured with them. I went through all the usual rigmarole with them, interspersed with music and information that told me what a good company they were and how they looked after their customers, especially the over 50's: finally they came up with a figure that was just £2 more than the existing insurer. I made my excuses, saying that I would get back to them (this figure was with a 10% discount as well). Don't you just get fed up with all this hassle every year!! I then rang my my existing insurer and finally got hold of a real person: I explained the situation and was told that there were two reasons that it had increased on last year - one was that the government had increased insurance tax (blame the politicians) and secondly that I was now over 80 years old and, presumably, a bad risk. I said that even taking all this into account, a rise of 33% was a bit excessive, and he even agreed! "Wait a minute" he said, "and I will see what I can do". When he came back to me he said that he was able to reduce the premium as I had "an unblemished record". The reduction? - £51. Not as much as I had hoped but worth the effort anyway.

Big Ben has been silenced now for four years, apparently to protect the workers working on the renovation of the tower from the noise – how about issuing them with ear muffs?

I see that the confectionery company Nestle are bringing out a new version of their famous Walnut Whip – the difference? No walnut! I wonder if they will call it Walnutless Whip?

We had a trip out to a garden centre recently; it was to Gates Garden Centre near Oakham. I believe that the Garden Club have visited here in the past. It's several years since we were there and it has been much enlarged since our last visit – in fact, it is huge, more like a shopping experience than a humble garden centre, with a huge new extended car park; quite an eye opener.

We read a lot these days about "global warming" and the effect it has on our lives. One of these effects is that glaciers are melting at a faster rate than ever before. A glacier in Italy has melted sufficiently to reveal a grisly secret. Hikers there recently found two bodies, one with no legs, along with a German ID card issued in 1995. The ice crushed these victims back in the 1990's and they were uncovered earlier this summer as the glacier retreated. Once exposed to the sun they dry out before they can be found.

These bodies are the latest of several discoveries in recent years. About a month ago the well preserved bodies of a Swiss couple, who went missing in 1942 while going to milk their cows, were found near a Swiss ski resort. Corpses of soldiers who fought in Alpine battles between Italy and the Austro-Hungarian Empire in the first world war emerge regularly and a collection of jewels were found on Mont Blanc in 2013, apparently from an aircraft that crashed in 1966 – so far though, no UFO's or little green men have been found.

Recycling Waste Update From Boston Borough Council

This is a generic message to all residents in the Borough regarding your blue recycling bin.

We are no longer emptying blue recyclable bins that contain plastic bags. All recyclable waste MUST be loose in your blue bin. Blue recycling bags can be used for excess waste only and



will be collected if they are left at the side of your bin on your collection day but must not be placed into your blue bin. Blue recycling bags are free of charge and remain available to collect from the Municipal Buildings on West Street, Boston.

Bin liners cannot be recycled and can hide items which at best cannot be recycled and at worst may pose a hazard to our collectors and sorters. Any blue bins that contain plastic bags from now will be classed as contaminated and your bin will be rejected.

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

Local Worthies

Elizabeth Allan (1910-1990)

Elizabeth Allan was born in Skegness – she was the youngest of six children, three boys and three girls, of Dr Alexander William Allan and his wife Amelia. They lived in Sandbeck House in the town and appear to have been quite prosperous, employing a groom, cook, housemaid and a nurse for Elizabeth.

She attended Skegness Day School and then Polam Hall school in Darlington where she excelled in elocution and enjoyed acting. As a senior at this school she was just one of ten girls in the entire country to be awarded a scholarship to the Old Vic Theatre training school for actresses. It is reported



that her parents were not too keen for their youngest daughter to go on the stage.

She taught in a school in Skegness to earn some money and fill the gap before the winter season started at the Old Vic. She excelled as an actress while she was there and at the tender age of seventeen began a two year tour of the country with a Shakespearean repertory company.

This was the start of her career and she appeared in such productions as "The Taming of the Shrew" (1927) and "The School for Scandal" (1928): she also appeared in the film "Insult" (1932) with John Gielgud. Whilst involved in the theatre and film world she had met Wilfred J. O'Bryen, and they were married in 1932.

Also in 1932 she appeared in the film "Reserved for Ladies": after its London opening the film had its premiere in New York; she was "spotted" by MGM Studios who offered her a deal. She went to America (and Hollywood): she had appeared in fifteen British films prior to going on to Hollywood.

In her Hollywood career she appeared in several films, one in particular was with Clark Gable. According to the gossip of the time, Gable developed quite a "crush" on Elizabeth (and vice versa), although Gable was married at the time, as was Elizabeth. However, in late 1935 she is quoted as saying "Clark Gable means absolutely nothing to me", so it appears that it was all over.

Over time she is thought to have had affairs with various men, developing a reputation that made her notorious among her contemporaries. Meanwhile, her husband Bill O'Bryen spent a lot of time travelling between London, where he was working, and Hollywood, doing his best to save the marriage. In

this he succeeded, for they remained married up until his death in 1977.

In the late 1930's she hit a stumbling block; she was in dispute with MGM over the fact that she had been awarded the role in a film, but had then been replaced by another actress. The matter went to court and , in the end MGM won; that spelt the end of her Hollywood career – she was never able to work there again.

She returned to England in 1939 and resumed her career on stage by playing Wendy in a production of Peter Pan. The war had started and her husband was a Captain in the armed forces and their relationship seemed to have moved closer. She moved to London and helped in a canteen, cooking and serving meals to help in the war effort.

She also continued her work on stage, appearing in various productions, as well as radio work.

Her next celebrity role appeared in 1951, when she became a popular member of the panel on "What's My Line", along with such names as Gilbert Harding and Eamonn Andrews. She also continued her film career, appearing with such stars as James Stewart and Marlene Dietrich.

Her final role on the big screen was in 1958 when she appeared with Boris Karloff in "The Haunted Strangler".

She made a couple of guest appearances in the 1960's on TV but after this her career seems to have wound down; she and her husband retired to live in Hove, where he died in 1977. Elizabeth continued to live there until her own death in July 1990, aged 80.


Blisbury Charity Student Grants

September has been a little disappointing for weather but seemingly good for the plants. Many of the perennial varieties are flowering again for the second or even third time. Well worth

the time spent cutting back flowering stems earlier in the year.

If you are planning to plant evergreen shrubs for hedges, or lay new lawns, or even repair worn and patchy grass September and October are ideal.

You can go to town on cutting hedges now without the risk to nesting birds. Most hedges cut now will stay compact and withstand winter weather.

Mow lawns when you can, as the days become shorter and the mornings are often very dewy it is more difficult, especially if like me you have clay soil that holds the water. It is very easy to cut grooves into the ground which then become mossy.

Let's hope that October is kind to us with dry sunny days, that would be a bonus we would all welcome, gardeners or not.

Enjoy the changing colour in your trees and shrubs, Autumn can be so beautiful.

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The Cathedral Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Lincoln.

The cathedral is the mother church of the Diocese and the parish church of the County. At the time it was built it was the head of the largest diocese in England – it extended from the Humber to the Thames.

As far as it is known the site of the cathedral was a virgin site when construction was first begun by the Normans, although it is possible that a small Saxon church, constructed of timber and thatch may have been on the site.

The high ground which the site occupies was recognised by the Romans as a defensible site when they established their camp here – it was high ground with a large pool at its base (now known as the Brayford Pool).

Before the Romans came there was an Iron Age settlement here, probably a collection of timber and thatch dwellings which lined the side of a river pool (Brayford). When the Romans established their fortress here around 48AD, this

being laid out by the Ninth Legion, it was a classic rectangular plan built on the high, level ground above the pool; this offered a natural fortification for them to control the inhabitants of the watery marshes and flat lands below them. Together with hundreds of miles of road building they connected Lincoln with all their other major centres of administration, such as London and York.



After the fall of the Roman Empire (410AD) and their withdrawal from Britain, Lincoln became the capital of the kingdom of Lindsay. The Anglo Saxon population lived within the old Roman city which was mainly contained within the town walls. They constructed their timber and thatch houses and used materials from the Roman ruins to construct their small churches within the community.

And so the town continued after the Romans, with raids and incursions by the Vikings and the sacking of many Anglo Saxon churches.

In the period 1035 – 1072 Lincolnshire was considered "outlaw country". Hereward the Wake held sway in the marshy fens and, upon the Norman invasion (1066) he and his band resisted the invaders. There was a lot of sympathy for Hereward in Lincoln itself as, with the building of the castle the citizens of the town were faced with the demolition of 166 of their houses to make way for the new castle. The new castle was built, probably just a mott and bailey at this stage (a mound surrounded by a wooden palisade). By this time the Bishop of Lincoln was a Norman by the name of Remigius, a friend, possibly a relative, of William the

Conqueror. It was he who was given the task of creating a cathedral in the town.

It was begun in 1072 and was one of the earliest to be built by the Norman regime – the building was completed "over 20 summers", according to records. It appears that this structure lasted only about 150 years. Remigius did not live long enough to see the final completion of his task: he died in May 1092, just 2 days before the consecration of his new cathedral, in the name of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Remigius was the first Norman Bishop of Lincoln – he had been a Benedictine monk and a loyal supporter of William at the Battle of Hastings in 1066

Lincoln is the only cathedral that is built of the stone that it stands on. It has its own quarry that is still used today to provide stone for maintenance.

In 1137, during the Civil War, there was a battle at Lincoln when the Kings forces attacked the castle – they were resisted by the rebels: the King fled but was captured. With the castle and cathedral being so close together, what affected one would, by proximity, affect the other; and so it was at this time. There are signs of a fierce fire and scorch marks on the internal walls of the west front of the cathedral.

There was severe fire damage to the roof of the church in 1141, restoration work following this was carried out by the 3rd bishop, Alexander the Magnificent; this included replacing the wooden ceiling with stone vaults.

According to the records, on April 15th in 1185 the cathedral was reported to be "split from top to bottom". This is blamed on an earthquake which was said to have been heard "throughout nearly the whole of England". Certainly a lot of damage was caused in Nottinghamshire at the same time. It is now recognised as having been one of the most powerful on record in Britain, with a magnitude of 5 on the Richter Scale. Following the earthquake it took 7 years of planning and preparation to begin to rebuild the cathedral; this left the west block, which had survived, standing alone, looking more like a castle than a church. Fund raising efforts took place and, as well as gifts of money being made, land and property was gifted, rents from which allowed the church to be rebuilt longer than it had been before – the old city wall had to be breached to allow for the new extension.

It was at this time that one of the most influential men connected to the cathedral reigned as Bishop. A monk, Hugh of Avalon (1140-1200). He was elected as Bishop of Lincoln in 1186: it was during his lifetime that the new cathedral took shape. He dedicated work on the new cathedral and work began. Foundation trenches were dug and footings laid: work started, with the local honey coloured limestone used as building material. By the time of his death in 1200 the building was so far advanced that he was buried in it. He was said to have carried a hod and helped with building work. This building work was a summer activity as the lime mortar that was used would only set properly after the winter frosts had finished.
