The Lifeboat Appeal was the chosen charity this year but the Club very generously donated £150 towards the repairs of the fabric of the Church. Thank you all so much, the Wigtoft Friends also helped during this weekend and again there was a very friendly atmosphere. Thank you all.

Harvest Celebration.

Our celebration began with the Harvest Songs of Praise Service at 3pm on Sunday 9th October and was followed by a ploughman's meal in the church. The Friends had again been very busy and the food was excellent and plentiful enjoyed by all. After the meal we had our Harvest Auction, Chris Tunnard.as ever was our encouraging Auctioneer and persuaded us to part with our money in his usual friendly manner. Many had donated various vegetables, cakes, jams etc. and we would like to thank you all for the donations that were made for the auction. This event raised £580 towards our roof repairs and the upkeep of the church and we are so grateful for the input that you give to the church.

Roof Repairs

At long last we have heard from Boston Borough Council Planning Dept. and our architect has also been notified. We hope to have planning permission given by the end of December and we will then be able to continue with applying for the grant. It has been a long wait from our initial contact with the planning dept. and that of our architects contact with them.

We have all other paperwork ready to proceed with our application for a faculty, which includes insurance, a resolution from Wigtoft PCC which is an agreement that we are all willing to go ahead with the work. The Diocesan Advisory Committee in Lincoln have already discussed our submission re the roof and are willing for us to go ahead when we have the rest of the relevant paperwork. The architect has sent out letters for tenders and one of these has already been to visit and will shortly be sending a quote. As in most cases we need three of these before we can make a decision. We are looking forward to the New Year so that we can get this project really moving.

Topical Talk

As I write this Donald Trump has just been declared president Elect of the United States of America. Perhaps, like me, you have been following (loosely) this "pantomime" for the past year or so: at times it has been more like a schooldays slanging match than a grown up election campaign, with Trump suggesting that Hilary Clinton should be behind bars over her e-mail mistakes, and she throwing his "womanising" lifestyle at him.

Lets hope, from now on, we can get some grown up politics from the US instead of the petty, or not so petty, depending on your point of view – because, like the old saying, when America sneezes the rest of the world catches a cold: if things are not going well with them we are all affected in some way or other.

I was reading recently about a computer programmer, one Mark Rittman, who lives in Sussex, and his wi-fi kettle. At 7am on this particular day he fancied a cuppa, so he tried to use his voice recognition technology to switch the kettle on – it refused to work, which led, in his words, to an 11 hour stand off. This epic battle was played out on social media (yes, I'm a bit vague about this too) with Mr Rittman tweeting his marathon effort to get the kettle to work. At 10am, three hours later, he stated that he still had no tea – in his words "mandatory recalibration caused wi-fi base station reset, now port scanning network to find where kettle is now". (Are you still with us?)

Word spread quickly on line of the lengths an Englishman was going to for his morning cuppa and soon thousands of people around the world were following the developments in the Rittman kitchen. However, in a cruel twist of fate the weight of global interest left Mr Rittman further away than ever from his cherished cuppa. At 10 30am he had to explain to his followers that their messages of support were "saturating his network" and "blocking integration of the kettle to its base station".

As the morning progressed it emerged that the key problem was that the kettle did not come with the right software to allow integration with his Amazon Echo, the voice recognition device he was using.

Undeterred, Mr Rittman, who works for the US software company Oracle, tried to build the integration functionality himself (are you still with me). By early evening his followers were given the news they had been hoping to hear – MAN HAD BEATEN MACHINE. "The kettle is back on line and responding to voice control" a triumphant Mr Rittman posted, "and now on to everything else I meant to do today after that first cup of tea".

And I used to think that when we were kids, laying the fire, lighting it and boiling the kettle, or lighting the Primus Stove to do the same was hard work -we never had it so good !!!.

On holiday recently in Suffolk we decided, on the journey down, to stop off in Thetford (Norfolk) for a bite to eat at lunch time. We found the car park and an empty space, no problem: I went to look for the ticket machine to pay for the privilege, but was unable to do so. On asking a local man about the cost of parking he told me, much to my surprise, that "all parking in Thetford is free". This was true, honest. When I had picked myself up off the floor (?) and thanked the man for his help, we wandered off to find a bite, not having to worry about the possibility of a "ticket" under the wiper when we got back. The only other time I have come across this was in Ayr in Scotland a year or two back, when all the beach side parking was free.

It beats the Boston "fiasco" where, on the old cattle market you pay £2 50 for 3 hours or, at the Pilgrim Hospital where, not too long ago, I paid £1 50 for 10 minutes – and they say the NHS is free!.

I would just like to put in a "plug" for the village church if I may. In times gone by, this building and, indeed, all village churches, were thought of as places for prayer and for those of a religious frame of mind. Todays thinking is a little different, in that the building is part of the village and whether you are a deeply religious person or not the place is there for you. We have obtained a grant to make the roof watertight and this work, hopefully, will be taking place during 2017. There are a willing group of volunteers who clean the place, put on money raising events and try to keep the churchyard tidy (we always need more), but the point I am trying to make is that the building is there for all, not just the few!. It is open every day from around 10am to around 3pm, there is a "library" of books there for sale (cheaply) and there are a number of people who take advantage of this facility – just leave the money in the container, or just wander around the place and "feel" the history it contains. Its your place so why not cherish it and look after it. (End of sermon)

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

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Trump of Trumpton!



Local Worthies

Lieutenant-Colonel John Lindley Marmion Dymoke MBE Queen's Champion (1926-2015)

After the Norman Conquest William the Conqueror offered the Manor of Scrivelsby in Lincolnshire to Robert Marmion on condition that he took the title of King's Champion – this entailed the duty of rebutting any challenge to the King's right to rule. This title has remained with the family to this very day. The family name changed to Dymoke in 1350 when the male line died out and a granddaughter of the Marmion family married Sir John Dymoke and brought the Scrivelsby estate with her.

Lieutenant-Colonel John Lindley Marmion Dymoke held the post from 1946 until his death: he heard about having inherited the title when he was fighting with the armed forces in Sumatra. As it turned out his services as Queen's Champion were not needed for another six years, at the Queen's Coronation. He was summoned in 1952 from Egypt where he was serving with the 1st Battalion the Royal Lincs Regiment.

From 1377 to 1821 the role of King's Champion was an essential part of every Coronation; the Champion, clad in splendid armour, complete with plumed helmet, would ride into Westminster Hall and cast his gauntlet to the ground as a herald cried out three times that any who opposed the Coronation might challenge the Champion to mortal combat – there is no record of anyone having picked up the gauntlet (except for the case of the "old lady").

The last Dymoke to ride into Westminster Hall to throw down the gauntlet did so at George 1V's Coronation banquet in 1821. John Dymoke's grandfather Frank carried the Standard of England at the Coronation of Edward V11, George V and George V1.

When John was summoned to the Queen's Coronation in 1952 he was only 26 years old and very nervous.

Before leaving the army in 1972 he had served in three military campaigns: he served in Sumatra, in Malaya during the communist insurrection and also in Aden with the Royal Anglia Regiment. His main interest now was the family estate at Scrivelsby – the main house was in a bad state of repair so he decided to demolish it and he renovated the elegant gatehouse as the main family home. The main asset of the estate was a 500 acre farm. By the time he handed over the farm to his eldest son in 1992 the estate had been made into a profitable one. He was married to Susan Fane of Fulbeck Manor from 1953 until his death;

they had three sons, the eldest, Francis, managing the farm while the second son Philip followed his father into the army: the youngest Charles is an insurance underwriter.

The eldest son Francis succeeded his father as Hereditary Queen's Champion.

The following is an article from the "Gazetter" dated August 1784 in respect of Charles Dymoke in 1689 as King's Champion.

"The Champion of England (Dymoke), dressed in armour of complete and glittering steel, his horse richly covered and his beaver finely capped with plumes of feathers, entered Westminster Hall according to ancient custom, where the King and Queen were at dinner. And, at his giving the usual challenge to anyone that disputed their Majesties right to the Crown of England – after he had flung down his gauntlet on the pavement an old woman, who entered the Hall on crutches took it up and made off with speed, leaving her own glove with a challenge in it to meet her the next day, at an appointed hour, in Hyde Park. This caused some mirth at the lower end of the Hall and it was remarked that everyone was too well engaged to pursue her. A person in the same dress appeared the next day at the place appointed, though it was generally supposed to be a good swordsman in disguise. However, the Champion of England politely declined any contest of that nature with one of the fair sex and never made his appearance".

John Dymoke was appointed MBE in 1960. he was High Sheriff of Lincolnshire in 1979 and Vice Lord-Lieutenant of the County from 1991-2001.

Lincoln Castle

The Court House

Lincoln Castle is still a "working" castle in the sense that the County Court is located here. The present building dates from 1836, which replaced a building dating from 1776. There was also one previous to this called the Old Shire Hall

The latest building is still used today as Lincoln Crown Court: a court has been dispensing justice from here for 900 years.

The Prison

As was normal the castle also served as a prison from the outset,

providing secure detention for both criminal and political prisoners.

One of the towers of the castle, called Cobb Hall, has a dungeon reached by a hatch in the floor and this hatch, the only entrance to the dungeon, would have been used to "drop" the prisoners through to the floor below and which provided very little prospect of escape; there is quite a lot of graffiti on the walls here, believed to have been carved by prisoners held here.

The roof of this hall was used, from 1817, for the erection of a gallows for public executions. In all, 38 hangings took place here and the last one was in 1859. William



Marwood, the hangman from Horncastle, carried out his first execution here.

During the 1700's one well known prisoner at Lincoln was Samuel Wesley, father of John Wesley, the founder of Methodism; he was imprisoned for three years in 1705 for owing £30.

In 1817 Elizabeth Whiting from Kirton was hung on the Cobb Hall gallows after she had poisoned her child and in 1830 John Clarke was the last man in England to be hung for sheep stealing.

Priscilla Biggadike from Stickney was executed in 1868 – she died still protesting that she was innocent of the murder of her husband.

William Frederick Horry of Boston was hanged in 1872 for shooting his wife.

The last public execution at the castle was that of William Picket and Henry Carey, two young men from Sibsey who murdered an elderly man in the process of robbing him. This execution attracted a crowd of 20,000 people.

The last execution (not public) was that of William Clarke in 1877 for the murder of a gamekeeper.

In the 1600's witchcraft was among one of the most serious charges that could be brought against anyone and this was invariably directed against women. In 1619 two sisters, Margaret and Phillipa Flower were charged with causing the death, by witchcraft, of Lord Rosse, son of the Duke of Bedford – they were tried and hanged at Lincoln.

The present prison building, built in 1787 and extended in 1847, is now used for other purposes. The cells are open for viewing by visitors, there is a cafe and shop and the lower level has been used to create a secure home for the Lincoln Magna Carta.

The Magna Carta

Lincoln's Magna Carta is one of only four that survive from 1215 and is now displayed in the Magna Carta Vault, specially created below the old prison to provide good conditions for the storage and also public viewing of the document.

This charter was drawn up by a committee of twenty five barons to curtail the King's power and guarantee certain rights and civil liberties.

It was signed at Runnymede in 1215.

In 1217 the Charter of the Forest was issued – this extended several clauses of Magna Carta and specified greater freedom in the King's forests where, up to now, there had been harsh laws in relation to any activity in these places, which were almost all classed as "Royal" forests.

George III Statue

There is a bust of George III standing in the grounds of the castle. This is the top part of a statue that was on top of the Dunston Pillar (between Lincoln and Sleaford). This was removed in the early years of WW2 because it was considered a hazard to the low flying bombers that were stationed at nearby airfields.

East Gate and West Gate

There were two entrances to the castle, the east and west gates. The east gate is the one that faces the town and is the main entrance today. In its heyday it was heavily defended; twin towers known as barbicans stood as the first line of defence here, but sadly, they no longer exist, but there are circles of cobbles in the ground to indicate where they once stood.

The west gate, obviously facing west, faced onto open countryside and was probably considered to be a good "exit" point should the castle be overrun in the event of an attack.

Actually, over its whole history, there has been very little military activity in the way of attacks, although it saw some action during the Civil War.

The Castle Today



In 2012 a three year programme of renovation was started at the castle. This entailed creating a walk around the top of the walls, taking you all round the curtain wall, creating a new centre for the display of Magna Carta, providing visitor facilities and opening sections of the old prison to the public.

Guided tours are given by the castle guides who belong to the Friends of Lincoln Castle.

At the time of writing there is a shuttle service operating from Whisby Garden Centre which is to the west of the city and giving

you free parking – the drop off point is close to both the Castle and the Cathedral.

Sam Snail's Jobs In The Garden

Winter has arrived after a glorious autumn show of colour, before the leaves fell from the trees and deciduous shrubs.

There seems to be a good amount of berries for the birds which is such an important source of food for them in the winter. If possible after clearing the paths and lawns of leaves try to keep areas where they do no harm with a covering of fallen leaves. Insects hide under them which the birds can discover. The worms pull them into the soil which is beneficial

nutrients for your plants. If you leave some of the top growth on border perennials, it helps to protect the crowns in the frostier weather. Save hard cutting back until the early spring. Seed heads of Phlomis and teasels and some grasses look lovely with the frost on them.

When you decorate the house for Christmas a vase of evergreen stems such as Holly, Laurel and Yew hung with small baubles is a traditional and inexpensive addition to a hall or corner of a room. The taller the better, try adding a small set of battery operated lights as an alternative Christmas tree.

House plants need to be moved away from windows at night and take care not to have them too close to radiators as it is better to reduce the amount that you water them over the winter.

Potter in the garden on nice days, it's surprising what you find to do.

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
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
