Topical Talk

Happy New Year to all – better late than never! Weatherwise, we seem to be getting a very mild winter so far; having said that, there is still plenty of time for some of the "white stuff". I well remember the winter of 1947 when the heavy snowfalls came very late – I believe they were in March, and we had many of our local roads blocked and as quick as the blockages were cleared the quicker they seemed to block again, as the snowfalls were accompanied by strong winds. The use of salt had not been introduced at the time and, the war having been over for less than two years, there was a severe lack of money for machinery to clear the blocked roads and most of the work had to be done by gangs of men with shovels.

My wife had a letter in November last year from the Pension Service and I quote:

"Now that you are approaching 80 you are entitled to a higher amount of State Pension. Age addition of 25p per week will be payable from your 80th birthday".

We are still having an exciting time trying to work out how to spend it!!.

You will probably remember that in my last Topical Talk I mentioned that Rugby School in Warwickshire was having a bit of a clear out of its unwanted items and that they had expected to raise about £3 million in the process. The sale took place in December and the prices realised far exceeded all expectations: a drawing by Lucas van Leyden had been expected to fetch around £1.5 million, but in actual fact it was sold for £11.5 million. In total the sale realised £15 million, far in excess of anyone's expectations.

A recent "doggy" story is guaranteed to touch the hearts of dog lovers everywhere, and probably those of us who do not belong to the dog set. The story concerns an ex-soldier called Sean Laidlaw and a puppy called Barrie. Sean, when he was in the army, completed two tours of duty in Afghanistan with the Royal Engineers: he found Barrie while working with a bomb disposal team in Syria; the dog is a mix between a Canaan and an Anatolian shepherd and Sean found her while he was working at the remains of a school in Raqqa – the dog was cowering in the school wreckage surrounded by four dead puppies: Sean spent three days taking food to Barrie before she grew confident enough to go with him. The pair then became inseparable for the rest of the tour, until his contract expired last April. Sean had kitted the dog out with a harness fashioned from a bullet proof vest and she played with a teddy bear made from an old pair of jeans. She stayed with Sean all day, every day, she went on jobs with him, she ate with him and sat in his car with him.

When his contract expired he was determined to keep the dog, but faced many problems. He was on two weeks leave in the UK when his contract expired and he was told that he would not be returning to Syria.

He contacted a charity called War Paws who specialise in delivering war zone animals to safety; with their help the obstacles were overcome and Sean was eventually reunited with Barrie at Charles de Gaulle airport in Paris. He said that one of his biggest fears was that she would not recognise him or that she would be a different dog to the one he had left behind. But he need not have worried as she knew who he was straight away and the long wait to be reunited was well worth it.

A new greenhouse has just been built at Bramford, near Ipswich – not just your ordinary, run of the mill glasshouse; this one covers 14 acres and is purely for the production of tomatoes; it will produce around 150 million tomatoes a year. A quarter of a million plants have been planted and they will start producing fruit next month.

This project is the most technologically advanced farming of its kind in Britain; having said that, bees will still be used for pollination. The plants will be grown without the use of soil or compost, the fertiliser being incorporated in the water – this water being from the farm's own reservoir which collects rain water from the roof of the glasshouse. The heating system is operated by two 6000 Kw boilers.

This is a three year project that will cost £3 million and will eventually cover 42 acres and produce nearly 1600 tons of tomatoes each year.

A spokesman for the company said that, even though this is production on an epic scale, the flavour of the tomatoes will be "superb".

Farming Report January 2019

As it is almost a year since I wrote a farming report for the magazine, I will now give an update on the land.

By early January most of the winter wheat has been drilled. With the weather being so mild, most of the crop looks very well and has a good colour. The oil seed rape is also looking good having so very few frosts so far and little pigeon damage. If we get some sharp frosts in January/February the situation can change quickly as we all know.

As most of the locals understand there is a huge amount of vegetables grown and packed in the Boston/Spalding area, so the outcome of Brexit we are hearing so much about on the news will have a big bearing on all Lincolnshire farmers! Big haulage companies like "Fresh-Link" and "Turners" move a large amount of packed vegetables every night from Dover to Calais and also to Belgium on the ferries. So, if they change the export levies they will all be badly affected. I don't wish to see more food being imported from other countries, particularly if it produces lower standards.

The UK has some great food products so keep looking for the "Little Red Tractor" as you do your shopping!!

Hare coursing continues to be a problem in this area. They are now driving across a lot more fields causing considerable damage to the crops. The people involved often have links to other criminal activities. I urge anyone who sees active hare coursing taking part in the area to report the incident to the Police on either 101 or 999.

Hopefully I will write another report in the summer to give you an update on the crops and how they are growing.

Local Worthies

Richard Budge (1947 - 2016)

Richard Budge was a Boston born entrepreneur who became known as King Coal. He was an ex Boston Grammar School pupil who, whilst he was still at school, had a gift for art: by the age of 16 he was painting landscapes and selling them for 25 guineas. On leaving school he embarked on a fine arts course at the University of Manchester, but he only lasted 3 months, after which he left.

His father ran a local house building firm (F. Budge); Richard had an older brother Anthony, who had started his own construction company A.F.Budge Ltd. On leaving his art course Richard joined his brother, starting at the bottom, labouring, but soon became involved in management. At the age of 21 he was put in charge of building a 5 mile length of the A19 in South Shields.

The company diversified into open cast coal mining as a licensed contractor and Richard became increasingly more involved in this. In 1992, backed by City venture capitalists, he bought out the open cast coal and plant division from his brother and re branded it RJB Mining.

When the coal industry was privatised in 1994 he bought most of the pits for £815 million. This proved to be controversial within the company and with his fellow directors and he was ousted as chief executive officer in 2001 and the company changed its name to UK Coal. He then bought Hatfield Colliery and formed the company Coalpower; but this went into administration in 2003 and Hatfield was closed. He then founded another company, Powerfuel, which he part owned along with a Russian coal producer – they re-opened Hatfield in 2007 but by 2010 it was forced into administration. In 2013 Budge was declared bankrupt.

Richard had a love of fast cars and at one time was racing himself and he was quite successful, but his wife Rosalind, his teenage sweetheart was not too pleased about the fast cars, so he was persuaded to promise her he would stick to classic cars.

In 1993 he was involved in a case with the Receiver when his brother's business went into receivership – there appears to have been a tangle of expenses, between private and business involving a bizarre range of activities, including yachts, race horses and antiques – it had even bought a Scud missile launcher and an anti-aircraft gun and there were questions about the buying of racing cars. Richard paid the Receiver £325 million without admitting liability. This did not go away as he hoped and two years later the BBC programme Panorama picked up on it and his suitability as a director was put into question.

He was diagnosed with prostate cancer in 2007 which clouded his last years – he was 69 years old when he died. He is survived by his wife and two sons, Kurt and Grant.

Hungry thrushes eagerly await the first snails which crawl out of hibernation.



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

Roman Cemetery

From an archaeologist's point of view, one of the most exciting finds in the village was that of a Roman cemetery – this was located under what is now the modern cemetery. This, in keeping with Roman law, was located outside the town boundaries so as not to threaten public health.

In the 1960's it was decided to excavate the Roman bodies as they were interfering with the use of the modern cemetery. In the first year of excavation 15 bodies were removed and in the second year 35, with a further 42 in the third year, a total of 92. Due to a lack of funds the findings of these excavations

have not been published: the hodies were mixture of male, female and children - one had been buried with bronze bracelets The burials had been mixture of lidded stone coffins. stone lined graves and some with iust stone markers at the head and feet, and some iust simple were trenches in which iron nails with wood attached

were found, indicating that there had been a wooden coffin at one time. Finds around the graves suggest that they were from the period 200 – 300 AD. Other graves have been found around the parish, including 9 during a development in Angel Court and 3 were discovered during the construction of a new grain silo at Ant House Farm; in the 1800's records show more finds.

A Time Team investigation in 2002 revealed a Roman burial and also uncovered Iron Age pottery, a 1st century brooch and some of the old Roman town wall.

Anglo Saxon Cemetery

An Anglo Saxon cemetery has been discovered near the modern cross roads to the south east of the village. About 40 cremation urns relating to a very early part of the Anglo Saxon period (pre 450 AD) were recorded by an Edward Trollope as having been found some time in the 1800's. These remains are currently the only evidence we have for Anglo Saxon occupation – no settlement remains have been found to date.

A conclusion by a Project Group that was set up to record the history of Ancaster came to the conclusion that the village has been robbed in the past by many groups of people, including professional archaeologists and amateurs, who came to the area, dug up artefacts and disappeared with them and may now be in private collections and museum stores, never to be seen again. Also, as previously stated, there is an urgent need for the village to be properly investigated from an archaeological point of view, and also for results of past digs to be published.

An old Roman milestone from the period 306 – 324 AD was kept for many years at the vicarage, but now resides in the Grantham museum.

In 2005 the once widespread plant known as Tall Thrift was discovered in Ancaster churchyard, one of only two locations within the country where the plant is found. A preservation regime for the plant was instituted by English Nature.

There is a town of Ancaster in Ontario, Canada that was first established in 1792 and was named after Ancaster, Lincs by a British Army officer by the name of John Simcoe: he became the first Lieutenant Governor of Upper Canada and he was apparently "inspired" in the choice of name by Peregrine Bertie, the 3rd Duke of Ancaster.

Sam Snail's Jobs In The Garden

The welcomed sight of the lovely Hellebores is arriving now. If you haven't removed last years leaves do it now, before the stems get longer. This reveals flowers to their best advantage when blooms open also it removes the risk

of leaf spot disease and takes away cover for bud eating rodents.

The leathery foliage of ground cover Bergenia develop reddish tints as the cold weather bites. They throw up their lovely pink flowers early in spring, another welcomed addition to the garden in the colder months.

Prune Wisteria this or next month, shortening the same shoots that were pruned in the summer, back to two or three buds from old wood. It looks drastic but increases flowering and maintaining shape, as Wisteria grows very quickly.

Look out for black spot on pansies, removing affected leaves, maybe even whole plants if they are badly affected. I must admit I didn't know they were prone to this. If you grow them in pots it is easy to spot.

All this depends on the weather of course, when we get more light it will help.

Action For Fraud Alerts

Fake TV Licensing Emails Alert

Action Fraud has received more than 5,000 reports about fake emails and texts purporting to be from TV Licensing. The messages contain links to genuine-looking websites that are designed to steal personal and financial information.

Always question unsolicited requests for your personal or financial information in case it's a scam. Never automatically click on a link in an unexpected email or text.

HM Revenue and Customs Alert

What you need to know

Action Fraud has experienced an increase in the reporting of malicious calls, voicemails, text messages or emails to members of the public purporting to be from HMRC.

The fraudsters state that as a result of their non-payment of tax or other duty, the victim is liable to prosecution or other legal proceedings such as repossession of belongings to settle the balance but can avoid this by arranging for payment to be made immediately by method such as bank transfer or by iTunes gift cards.

If the victim is hesitant or refuses to comply, the suspect makes a threat such as immediate arrest, bailiffs or in cases where the victim appears to be of overseas origin; deportation.

Often, the period for which the tax is allegedly due is distant enough to guarantee the victim will have little, if any, paperwork or ability to verify the claims. Once the money is paid the suspects sever all contact.

It is vital that the public exercise caution when receiving messages or telephone calls of this nature.

What you need to do

Always question unsolicited requests for your personal or financial information. Just because someone knows your basic details (such as your name and contact details), it doesn't mean they are genuine. Instead, contact the company directly using trusted methods such as a known email address or phone number

Listen to your instincts. If something feels wrong then it is usually right to question it. No genuine organisation will ask you to pay taxes, bills or fees using iTunes Gift Cards, or any other type of voucher.

Don't be rushed or pressured into making a decision. Under no circumstances would a genuine bank or some other trusted organisation force you to make a financial transaction on the spot.

Report Phishing attempts. If you receive a call, text or email of this nature and have not lost money, report this as a phishing attempt to Action Fraud

Long-term Foster Carers Needed in Lincolnshire

Lincolnshire Fostering Service has launched a new campaign urging the public to consider making their house a long-term foster home to a child or young person in need of such a placement.

The service is keen to highlight that there is a real and urgent need for people to come forward specifically for long-term fostering. This is where a child or young person stays with the same foster family until they reach adulthood.

Unfortunately, there is a shortage of people coming forward for this type of care, and so children and young people often have to wait longer for their long-term family to be found.

Many of the children who are currently waiting for a long-term foster family in Lincolnshire are part of a sibling group who need to be placed together with their brothers and sisters. It is recognized that being placed with their siblings can help a child settle into a new family and have a positive sense of who they are.

Long-term fostering can be challenging, but it is also hugely rewarding. There are numerous benefits to the child, namely having one stable family home to grow-up in for the rest of their childhood.

ACTION: agenda item for next meeting.

Clerk's Report

The Clerk reported that:

The printer is not working at the moment. I am using my own printer until I can get the PC printer working again.

The letter to the chicken farm about the footpath has not yet been sent. I went to have a look at the path and there is very little algae on it. I spoke to the Chairman about it and he suggested it might be better to wait until there is algae to be seen on the path. If you wish me to write anyway, please let me know.

Cllr Scrupps mentioned that ivy is becoming overgrown on the bus shelter. Does anyone know who owns the bus shelter?

ACTION: The algae on the footpath to be monitored and a letter to be sent to the chicken farm when appropriate. As the bus shelter is owned by the Parish Council, Cllr MT volunteered to cut the ivy back.

To review the play area inspection report and decide on any actions required. An update on the inspection of trees in the play area and to consider the quotation of £300 to reduce the row of trees at the play area adjacent to the path and road.

The report was reviewed. All items mentioned were deemed to be low risk apart from bird droppings on equipment. Please see comments under minute number. Regarding the inspection of trees in the play area, Darren Rush from Greenscape has advised that there is no work required in the play area but the trees along the edge of the road/public footpath require cutting back. He quoted £300 for this. It was resolved to accept this quote.

ACTION: Clerk to contact Darren and ask him to go ahead.

To start the budget planning process for 2019/2020.

Councillors reviewed the last 2 year's expenditure. A discussion was held about any other likely expenditure during 2019/20. The majority of the reporting lines for the budget were completed. **Action: Agenda item for next meeting to complete.**

To start the preparation of a Risk Management document.

The Clerk advised Council that an e-mail had been received regarding a parish council's liability when a tree on it's land fell into the path of a bus. The outcome of this case was that Parish Councils should implement a tree management strategy and framework. Inspection timetables need to be flexible to reflect the risk. A blanket approach cannot be adopted due to the complexity of setting up a risk management document. Councillors agreed that regular checks of the play area need to be made and documented. It was resolved that Cllrs PC and GW would take away the template for this document together with the play area inspection report and report back at the next meeting. **Action: Agenda item for next meeting.**

To decide whether to participate in the County Council's Winter Self-Help and Mutual Aid scheme and to decide if any new grit bins are required.

It was resolved that no new grit bins are needed. It was resolved to participate in the Self-Help scheme. Cllr PC offered for the 1 tonne bag of pre-packed salt bags to be delivered to his premises and also volunteered to be the designated "Snow Warden". **ACTION: Clerk to advise Highways accordingly.**

To decide whether to participate in the "Emergency Text Alert" System (e mail from LCC)

This system is being trialled by_Lincs County Council. It is a government backed emergency text alerting system to let strategic and tactical commanders know when the county emergency centre is activated and when it is stood down following an incident. It has been decided to include voluntary groups, town and parish councils.

It was resolved to sign up for this scheme. The primary emergency contact will be the clerk, using the Parish Council's mobile number. The secondary contact will be Cllr SC. **ACTION: Clerk to advise LCC accordingly.**

An update on the bank mandate, on line banking and debit card applications

The clerk reported that despite several "chaser" telephone calls, the new mandate is still not in place. There is one form missing which should have been sent by the Nat West Boston branch in August. This has been chased 3 times now. Cllr BL advised that he had received a call from the Boston branch. The Clerk advised that they were supposed to call her. It has been left with the Birmingham Team to chase again. No action can be taken regarding online banking and a debit card until the mandate is in place. ACTION: Clerk to visit local Nat West branch for an update. Clerk to chase Birmingham Business Centre for an update in 1 week.

An update on Highways issues and the Community Speedwatch Scheme

The potholes reported by a resident on Asperton Road near their property have been reported to Highways by the Clerk. Highways have advised that this is not a repair that they will consider at the moment. The resident has been advised and will personally report the potholes to Highways. No other work which has been confirmed has taken place yet. Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership has confirmed that the proposed sites for the passive speed notices are suitable.

ACTION: Cllr MT to erect the passive speed notices. Clerk to monitor other pending work for completion.

To discuss the footpath outside the chicken farm

Please see the Clerk's notes above. **ACTION: Clerk to monitor path.**

An update on the new GDPR regulations

The Clerk advised that that the only actions outstanding are a final review of the scheme and letters which are due to be issued to Councillors and the Clerk. **ACTION: Clerk to conduct final review and issue letters by the end of the year.**

An update on the noticeboard repairs

The repair has not yet been completed. Cllr SC will chase this.

An update on the Clerk's hours and current situation.

The Clerk advised Council that she is trialling a 4 hour working week. She advised that not all policies and procedures are in place yet but any outstanding work of this nature should not be too time consuming. The priority outstanding document is the Risk Management document. This was discussed under minute number 123/18 above. The Clerk also advised Council that she will be moving to Woodhall Spa in the New Year but that this move will not affect her working arrangements.

ACTION: Clerk to report back to Council at the next meeting.

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


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
