## Wigtoft Church Roof Repairs

Following a recent meeting with the appointed contractors and architect we have finally agreed a start date for the Church roof repairs that does not affect the bats.

Hopefully work on site will start either the third or fourth week of August and should last between 16 and 18 week, the work being completed by the end of this year.

Scaffolding will go up around the tower first, moving gradually along to the chancel. Hopefully no unforeseen problems will be found during the work, but it is impossible to be know what will be found once the existing roof covering is removed.

The contractors make a point of not using hi-vis jackets on site, so if you see anyone around the church, especially out of working hours, please call the police as they are probably there to cause damage or steal materials. The roof alarm will still be in operation when work is not taking place so there will still be a high level of security in place.

Services and events will still be taking place during the 4 months of work, there will be some minor disruption but hopefully nothing too serious. The Bacon Butty Mornings, Garden Club Flower Festival and Christmas Tree Festival will all go ahead as planned.

Once again, if you do see anything suspicious around the church please either contact a member of the PCC or the police as soon as possible

## Memories of Britain's Wartime


From 1949 we all learned to make a few sacrifices. Recycling was a large part of our lives. Aprons were made from parts of worn summer dresses. Parachute parcels underwear or frilly covers for our faded furniture. Sewing machines were a 'must have' in any household.





Potato rationing was threatened but never introduced. We had fields of them so were not too worried.

In the six dark war years Christmas Day began and ended without a real fuss. Children today get so many presents that they really don't appreciate them.



We only needed a slim purse to spend our clothing coupons. American soldiers gave their girlfriends gifts of nylon stockings, which the rest of us longed to possess.

Rice, tapioca, cornflour and even custard powder were in short supply but fortunately we had apple, pear and plum trees as well as raspberries and black and red currants. Our own milk, butter and eggs helped the pudding supply and flour seemed to be available.

Liquor was never rationed so we were able to enjoy a welcome cup of tea or coffee with the right spirit.

Britain won the war but we were worse off for a while. Bombing ceased but rationing continued. Spam helped the meat ration but was tasteless. No wonder those with the space reared their own pigs to supplement rations. I don't remember many overweight people in those days!

## **Topical Talk**

We were taken on a visit recently to Bletchley Park, near Milton Keynes. To the uninitiated this is the place that was at the centre of code breaking during world war two – this enabled the Allies to decipher vital messages sent by the Germans to their fighting forces, and gave us warning of their strength and weaknesses.

Bletchley Park was the birthplace of modern computing and many historians estimate that the efforts 0f these code breakers helped to shorten the war by up to 2 years and saved countless lives. At its peak around 10,000 people worked here and at its associated stations: so tight was the security here that the exact number is not known, even today. They tackled the complex task of intercepting, deciphering, analysing and distributing the intelligence gathered from enemy radio signals, while their work remained shrouded in the highest level of secrecy. Even to this day families of many of those who worked here never knew the full extent of their involvement.

A machine known as the "Bombe" was developed early on in the war to help in the process of deciphering – and eventually this led to the construction of another machine known as the "Colossus", the forerunner of the modern computer. By the end of the war there were 10 working machines at the Park.

One of the most memorable and probably one of the most tragic figures to be associated with Bletchley was Alan Turing. He had attended university at Cambridge and was a brilliant mathematician and was described by many people who knew him as a genius; it is possible, because of some aspects of his behaviour, that he was near-autistic. He was one of the driving forces behind the creation of the Colossus.

Turing was a homosexual, this at a time when it was a criminal offence, and this led him into trouble with the law. In 1952 he was charged with homosexuality, but was spared prison, but had to undergo treatment at Manchester Royal Infirmary.

His sentence expired in 1953 – he continued with his career, at this time with the University of Manchester in the Theory of Computing. Then, tragically, at the age of 42 he committed suicide. Had he been alive today his sexuality would have been accepted and he would have been recognised just for the genius he was.

We were having a discussion recently about the amount of debt that most graduates from university have on their graduation. It is quite common for them to have a debt of  $\pounds$ 50,000 round their neck, even before they have found a job: on top of this they are charged an interest rate of 6%. When they find work they have money deducted from their salaries monthly once they are earning in

excess of £22,000 per annum. But with a debt of £50,000, charged at 6% they find that debt increased by £3,000 a year, so that, unless they are earning a really good salary their indebtedness increases year on year. Their only respite is the fact that, after 30 years the government cancels their debt, but by this time they are in their 50's – there must be something to be said for not bothering to look for work !!!.

You may have read recently of the passing of Peter Sallis, better known as "Cleggy" of "Last of the Summer Wine". Though he played the part of a Yorkshire man in this role, he was in fact, born a Londoner and had grown up with a Cockney voice; this was "knocked out" of him when he was at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art (RADA) Before the onset of the war he had followed his father into banking but was not happy – at the outbreak of the war he enlisted into the RAF but failed his medical for aircrew, but became a radio instructor at Cranwell: it was here that he first became interested in acting, where a play a month was put on. When he was demobbed he successfully applied to join RADA. After many years playing supporting roles on the stage he was offered the part of "Cleggy", his first appearance being in 1973, and he was still there when the series ended in 2010, the only member of the cast who had appeared in all 295 episodes, then approaching 90 years of age.

Another of his successes was the voice of Wallace in the Wallace and Gromit series; he won Oscars for his part in these.

In his later years he had failing eyesight, suffering from macular degeneration, which meant that he could not read or recognise faces, he did his lines for Wallace by copying what the directors should at him.

He had a complicated private life; he married Elaine Usher, an actress, in 1957 and they had a son Crispian. The couple separated and reconciled at least 16 times and were finally divorced in 1965, only to re-marry. His wife died last year.

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## **Local Worthies**

## Brian Bolland

Brian Bolland was born in 1951 in Butterwick, near Boston. He is described as a writer, penciller and inker.

He is a comics artist, having worked extensively in the industry – he has been involved in many Batman productions and also the Judge Dredd series.

His parents were Albert John (A J) Bolland and Lillie Bolland; they were local farmers. As a youngster he had a "thing" about comics and he accumulated quite a collection – he began to draw his own comics by the age of ten featuring, as he says, "any big creatures that looked vaguely like a dinosaur". On family outings to Skegness he would trawl through local newsagents for comics to add to his collection, which he kept in a wooden bookcase which he had made in school woodwork.

He took both his O-levels and A-levels in art and then spent five years in art school, starting in 1969, learning graphic design and art history. He admits that learning to draw comics was more of a self taught thing, as for the five years he spent at art schools his tutors never taught him a thing about comics.

He wrote a 15,000 word dissertation on the artist Neal Adams in 1973, an artist his tutors had never heard of.

He married his girlfriend Rachel Birkett in 1981 – they have one son, Brian Bolland himself was an only child.

He has won many awards for his work, which he now carries out from America, having moved there in the early 1980's.

## Richard Dring Carter (1891-1969)

Richard Dring Carter was born at Hubberts Bridge, near Boston. His fame lies in the fact that he was a competent cricketeer, and was a right-handed batsman.

He was educated at Wellingborough Grammar School: early in his cricket career he played for Norfolk in minor counties cricket, making his debut for them against Essex Second X1 in 1920. Between 1920-1925 he made 44 appearances for Norfolk.

In 1927 he made his appearance for the East of England team against the touring New Zealanders at Wisbech Cricket Club: the New Zealanders won by 8 wickets; he was dismissed in the first innings for a duck and in the second innings he was dismissed for one run.

Later in his life he lived at Crabbs Abbey, Stowbridge. He died in August 1969; his brother and later, his son, both played minor counties cricket for Norfolk.

## **Historic Documents**

The newsletter team have been sent copies of some historic documents relating to Wigtoft and the surrounding area by someone living in New Zealand.

The documents, being old, are difficult to read but date from between about 1710 and 1750 and appear to be indentures. This type of document is normally a contract or agreement often relating to a young person working as an apprentice. But they can, as appears to be the case with these documents, be an contract or bond to work on, rent or buy land.

The main names in the documents relate to the Dawson family from Wigtoft at the time. Specifically they refer mainly to John Dawson in about 1713 and Samuel Dawson and his wife Mary in about 1740.

Other names mentioned from Wigtoft, Bicker, Swineshead, Kirton and Hofleet are Thomas and Margaret King, Richard Tomlinson, John Thomas, Johnathan Brown and Johnathan Grundy amongst others. Land around the Wigtoft area and even in Norfolk is referred to.

The custodian of these documents, Angela Taylor, is hoping to visit the UK in September and October and would like to be able to match the documents with families here. ## Sam Snail's Jobs In The Garden

What beautiful weather we are having, sunshine and warmth late into the evening is something we have not had for a few years. I know it makes gardening a little harder, unless you are

a real sun lover. Early morning is certainly the best time for tackling the physical jobs of mowing and hedge cutting but enjoy it while it lasts. Continue cutting fast growing hedges such as Privet and shrubby Honeysuckle. Hawthorns need their first cut now to keep them in shape, they grow overnight it seems. Carry on summer pruning restricted forms of apple, especially espaliers.

Peg down strawberry runners to repot later to replace old plants. When they have rooted cut them free from the main plant. You can peg them down straight into flower pots and then it is easy to just cut them free.

Cut back early flowering perennials, oriental poppies, hardy geraniums and delphiniums should be cut to the ground so that they can regrow and flower again in late summer.

Keep feeding tomatoes, cucumbers and peppers once a week and keep them well watered in this heat.

Don't forget to wear a hat and sun screen for working in the garden it is amazing how quickly you burn. Do what you can then catch up when it's cooler.



## **Somerton Castle**

The remains of Somerton Castle are located about one mile west of Boothby Graffoe, follow the appropriately named Castle Lane and the site is on your right. Although there is no public access to the site as it is privately owned, if you park on the roadside you can get an idea of the size of the site from the huge earthworks. There are two remaining



towers left of the old castle and these now form part of a large farmhouse which can be seen in the distance. The layout of the castle was more or less the standard of the time. It was roughly rectangular in shape and sat within a moat and with corner towers. The remains are Grade 1 listed.

The castle was built in 1281 by a man named Antony Bek. He gave it to King Edward 11 in 1309. One of its greatest claims to fame is the fact that the French King John 11 and his son were imprisoned here between 1359-1360, having been taken prisoner at the Battle of Poitiers. They were held here under the charge of Baron D'Eyncourt. The Kings stay was not exactly imprisonment as we would imagine it – he had a staff of 40 and fine French wine was imported through Boston for his consumption. During his stay at Somerton the French King supported several Lincolnshire churches and monasteries financially. In March 1360 it all came to an end – he made the 7 day journey back to London where his ransom of 3 million gold crowns were to be paid for his release.

The castle remained as Crown property until 1628, when it was bought by the Corporation of Lincoln. It then passed into the ownership of Sir Henry Hussey and has remained in private ownership ever since.

The surnames of D'Eyncourt and Hussey have local connections. D'Eyncourt Hall stood in Kirton Meeres until about the 1970's when, owned by the Denis family, it was decided to demolish it; this was done by placing many bales of straw inside it and setting it alight. The event was filmed by the BBC and I'm sure footage from the burning house will have been used over time. The original Hall dated back to William the Conqueror. The name still lives on in the village through the care home of the same name.

The Hussey family were prominent citizens of Boston – the Hussey tower on Skirbeck Road is the remains of their fortified dwelling from the middle ages. The first mention of the family seems to be around 1465 when the birth of John Hussey (1465-1538) was recorded. He became 1<sup>st</sup> Baron Hussey of Sleaford and chief Butler of England from 1521 until his death: he was a member of the House of Lords and a chamberlain to King Henry V111's daughter, Mary 1 of England.
