Grant information from Wigtoft Parochial Church Council

On the 4th January 2016, the PCC met to discuss applying for a grant from the Listed Places of Worship scheme relating to roof repairs that are necessary to St. Peter and St. Paul Church Wigtoft. All PCC members were present.

When the last Quinquennial inspection took place in 2014, (A Quinquennial inspection is a compulsory inspection that must take place every 5 years to monitor the condition of the building) various urgent repairs to the roof were identified. These repairs are necessary partly because of the lead thefts a few years ago and partly due to natural wear and tear over time. Other repairs were also identified but the ones to the roof are the most urgent to ensure that the building remains watertight. The work that was identified will cost in the region of £90,000 and the Roof Repair Fund has been set up by the government to cover this type of work to listed buildings. The grant would cover a large proportion of the costs but the PCC still need to contribute from Church funds.

There is quite a short window of opportunity to submit the application which closes on 26th February and applicants will hear if they have been successful in July. We went through the application forms and other information required and agreed that John and Myrtle would divide the work between them and for Colin to help with the Bat project. Contact with Natural England and a visit from the Bat Conservation Trust are necessary as we have to consider the protection of any Bats and apparently we have two species in the Church. Another inspection will be held in May. We have to be very careful when and how the work is be carried out if the grant is awarded, there is a £5,000 fine for every bat we disturb and imprisonment for any bat killed (we may need to look for a volunteer!)

Later that week John and Myrtle had a meeting with Ben Stoker and Dr Matthew Godfrey of the Lincolnshire Diocese at King Edward House, Lincoln as we felt we could benefit from their professional advice. This was an extremely informative meeting and we agreed that we would send a draft copy of our application to Dr Godfrey for his advice before it was submitted to LPW. He has now scrutinised the forms, backup documents etc. and he believes that it is an excellent application which will stand a good chance of success. Part of the backup information included our accounts for 2015 which John was able to finalise and the PCC met again on the 1st of February to approve them. As we were advised, the costings for this project have been taken from the Quinquennial as they are a good guide

To present a good profile we need to show that we can sustain our capability of seeing the work through so we have asked Rev. Charlie Robertson to be our Chairman and our architect Mary Anderson to be our project leader, both have agreed. The Diocesan Advisory Committee and Archdeacon have also provided letters of support for our application.

The Grant application has now been submitted and although there will be of plenty of competition we have as good a chance as the expected 3000 other applicants.

Topical Talk

Several thousand people were drawn to Skegness recently, not to enjoy the rides or to paddle, but to see the unusual and sad sight of beached whales. Five have now been washed up on local beaches between Skegness and Friskney, all thought to belong to the same pod or family. Another was washed up at Hunstanton and altogether a total of 29 have been washed up on North Sea beaches: this is the highest number in one period on an English coast since records began in 1913. The reason for this is controversial, but it is unusual to find so many in the North Sea, as whales normally prefer more open and deep water; for some reason they appear to have taken a "wrong turning" further north in the area around Norway and become disorientated as they entered the more shallow area off our east coast.

The photo shows a beached whale on the beach at Lindisfarne (Holy Island) off the Northumbrian coast around 15/20 years ago; in the picture is Charles Bristow (ex Wigtoft resident and my father-inlaw). When we found this one it was beginning to "smell" a little.



It is very sad to see such magnificent creatures in these circumstances, but you can't really begin to appreciate their size until you have actually stood at the side of one.

I have been reading the obituaries again!!!. This time it is the death of Gordon Goody. The name struck a chord with me, but I couldn't quite put my finger on why immediately, but on reading more it all came back. Unless, like me, you are "getting on a bit", the name probably won't mean anything to you. However, at the time that he came to prominence, everyone knew about him. He was one of the "Great Train Robbers" and one of the last survivors. The gang consisted of 15 men and their notorious crime was to rob a mail train: this robbery has been "glorified" to some extent in the past but it was, in fact, a vicious crime in which the train driver, Jack Mills, was coshed from behind and from which he never really recovered. The train was stopped in the Buckinghamshire countryside by the gang, who altered the signalling system to cause the train to stop; as it stopped the gang accessed the cab and the special carriage where 120 mail bags, containing mainly cash in used notes, were quickly unloaded even though staff tried to put up a resistance. The haul was in the region of £2.6 million, worth more than £40 million by todays values.

Goody was a "career" criminal, having for a time served in the army. After the robbery he buried £150,000 in cash under his scullery floor (£2 million in todays

money). Eventually he was arrested in Leicester where he was living under a false name with a girlfriend. He was sent to jail after his trial at Aylesbury, but after serving 12 years he was paroled and he went back to live with his sick mother. After this he quietly moved to live in Spain where he bought property; he had a partner here called Maria and they eventually moved to a smallholding where they had a daughter. At one time Goody was asked where he got his money from, he replied that he was "in the removal business". He died in January aged 85.

Jack Mills, the train driver, never fully recovered from his injuries after being coshed – he never worked again and he died in 1970 of leukaemia.

They say that life is full of coincidences, this has been proved by a woman by the name of Alisa Proctor. When she and her partner Richard bought Kirby Knowle Castle, just outside Thirsk in North Yorkshire, it was to provide them and their family with a home and to give the children room to roam about. The building is a Grade 11 listed castle – there were the usual tales of a secret tunnel within the walls and there was also a "priest hole" where Catholic priests were hidden from the Protestant "priest hunters".

Alisa's grandfather George Rogers, from Dagenham, Essex, had died in 1990: he was married to Edith and, like many of his generation, he fought in the war – he was wounded at Dunkirk, although he was always very reluctant to talk about it. It seems that, like many in his situation, he was sent away to recuperate, in his case, to Yorkshire; he couldn't remember the name of the place but he thought that it looked a bit like a fairy tale castle.

After they had bought the place and moved in around the year 2000, one of their sons was exploring in the attics and found some graffiti – he shouted his mother and much to their surprise they found that one of these read G.W. Rogers. London Edith. It was in her granddad's distinctive handwriting, written all those years ago; Edith, at that time was his sweetheart.

They had come to live in their granddad's fairy tale castle!!!.

Sam Snail's Gardening Jobs for March

I don't think that to say it has been wet and windy quite sums up how dreary and unpleasant the early part of this year has been, so far. I have noticed a few hardy souls have been toiling in their gardens despite it all. There are some wonderful spring flowers

and blossom displays already in gardens or verges and in the fields, when the sun has occasionally deemed to shine they glow in all their glory.

To show your Hellebores at their best, if you grow them, cut away all the large and diseased looking leaves to allow the flowers to emerge and be seen. Uncover any perennial plants that are shooting well from leaves that have blown onto them, and cut off last year's old growth. The new shoots should be hardy enough now to withstand any frosts. If you grow Dahlias and overwinter them, restart the growing process of the tubers now at about 16°C (61°f) either indoors or a slightly heated greenhouse.

Remove dead and dying leaves from bearded irises and perhaps apply a little fertilizer to give them a boost, if they have been in your borders a while.

When Snowdrops have finished flowering, if the clumps have become a good size, this is the time to divide and replant them to spread them around more areas.

Well at least the days are lengthening now which is lovely, so roll on the spring to make outside jobs more enjoyable for chilly mortals like me. I do like the sun on my back when I'm gardening.

Local Worthies Chris Woods (born Nov. 14th 1959)

Chris Woods was born in Swineshead and is a former Kirton School pupil.

He was a confident and agile goalkeeper and he signed for Notts. Forest as an apprentice in 1976, unfortunately, he seemed to live in the shadow of Peter Shilton, who played in the England team. Over the next three years he never made an appearance for Forest – Shilton came to the club in 1977 and did not miss a match.

In1979 Queens Park Rangers offered £250.000 for Woods even though he was not yet 20 years old: he made 63 appearances for his new club.

In 1981 he was sold to Norwich City and he firmly established himself as a top class goalkeeper; in 1985 he picked up a winners medal when they beat Sunderland at Wembley in the Cup Final.

England coach at the time, Bobby Robson, was impressed enough with Woods to take him on a post-season tour of America.

In 1987 he left Norwich for Rangers and in his first season he won a title medal and a Scottish League Cup Medal.

In August 1991 Rangers accepted an offer of £1.2 million from Sheffield Wednesday and Woods was on the move again. In the 1995-96 season he found himself out of favour at Wednesday and he had a short loan spell at Reading. After this he moved to the USA to play for Colorado Rapids.

In 1996 Graeme Souness, manager at Southampton negotiated his loan from Colorado to cover for Dave Beasant with a view to a permanent transfer, but

in his fourth appearance he broke his leg at Blackburn Rovers and returned to the US to recuperate.

He then returned to England and had spells at Sunderland and Burnley before retiring from playing in 1998.

In his international career Woods earned 43 caps for his appearances for England: he was part of the squads for two World Cups, Mexico 86 and Italia 1990.

In 1998 he took up a coaching position with Everton where he was tasked with the development of the club's goalkeepers.

In 2011 he was employed by the US National Soccer Team as goalkeeping coach, linking up with Everton's goalkeeper Tim Howard.

In 2013 he was released from his coaching contract with Everton and he joined David Moyes at Manchester United: when Moyes was sacked as manager, Woods remained with the United until May 2014 when he was told by the new manager that he was no longer required.

At the time of writing he is the goal keeping coach for the US National Team – he was with their team in the Brazil 2014 World Cup.

Chris Woods still has family in this area.

Sutterton Food Bank

The Food Bank is up and running in St Mary's Church Sutterton on Friday mornings from 10am to 12noon. It is not just for the people of Sutterton, but for anyone in our local communities who needs it. For those in need, enough food for 3 days can be accessed on production of a voucher. Our vouchers are interchangeable with those of the Boston Food Bank, open on Tuesday and Thursday from 12noon until2pm, at St Christopher's Church Fenside.

Vouchers can be obtained from various organisations such as Children's Centres, Schools, Nurseries, Citizens Advice Bureau, Social Services, Mayflower and Healthcare Professionals.

If you know of anyone who is in a crisis situation and where the Food Bank could help please direct them to one of these organisations as the Food Bank can only provide food to those with a voucher.

The food is largely donated by the general public e.g. supermarket collections. If you would like to donate items such as: cereal, jam, biscuits, pasta, tea bags, tins of soup, beans, spaghetti, macaroni, vegetables, rice pudding, there is a box in St Mary's Church near the font where these items can be placed.

The Town of Stamford

Burghley House

The house was built for Sir William Cecil, later 1st Baron Burghley, between 1558 and 1587. It became the residence of his descendants, the Earls, and later, the Marquesses of Exeter: since 1961 it has been owned by a family charitable trust.

The family fortunes were founded on the wool trade; much work was done on the estate itself by Capability Brown (1716-1783) the renowned landscape architect: it was he who re-designed the park and created the park's man-made lake. (He met and married a Boston girl by the name of Bridget Wayet).

The Doomsday Book records a village of Burghley but it appears to have been abandoned by 1450: archaeologists have failed to find any trace of this and it is assumed to be below Burghley House.

The house was built with stone from the Kingscliffe quarry in Northants – this is a very hard stone and wears very well.

The house is the venue for the annual Burghley Horse Trials and it has also been used in the filming of Middlemarch, The Da Vinci Code, Pride and Prejudice and Elizabeth – The Golden Age.

The Antiques Roadshow programme has also visited here.

The Uffington Estate

This estate is centred in the village of Uffington: it was bought by the Hon. Charles Bertie (1641-1711) from the Duke of Buckingham in 1673. The family built an imposing mansion here and it was held to be one of the greatest homes in Lincolnshire.

Unfortunately, this mansion was completely destroyed by fire in 1904 and was never rebuilt: the orangery survived the fire and this stood all alone until a few years ago (1980) when it was demolished and the stone used to rebuild boundary walls on the estate. The name lives on in the village inn, the Bertie Arms, parts of which date back 300 years.

The Hon Charles Bertie became the MP for Stamford. This family had ties with Grimsthorpe Castle: it is recorded that in 1715 Robert Bertie the 16th Baron Willoughby de Eresby had a new front built onto Grimsthorpe Castle

Churches

Stamford has a reputation for being the town with many churches: today there are five medieval parish churches within the town. In the 12th century the town had at least seven major churches and seven suburban ones, which reflected the wealth of the town at this time.



One of the oldest is All Saints in Red Lion Square; this is mentioned in the Doomsday Book, although very little remains of the original. The Browne family of Stamford were great benefactors of this church and the only people buried within the building are members of this family.

Another is Saint Mary's, which stands on the side of the old A1 coming out of the town past the George Hotel.

One particular church, St. Michael the Greater, which stands in the High Street has now, sadly, been converted into shops – the graveyard is still there, complete with stones but the building itself now houses shops.

In a list of current or former churches, no less than 17 are noted, though quite a few no longer exist, only the sites

Stamford Today

The town is a pleasant place to visit; there appears to be sufficient parking and there are many little streets and alleyways which, if you are interested, are intriguing.

The town has over 600 listed buildings: there is an interesting Arts Centre in St. Mary's St. in the town; it incorporates a small theatre which puts on productions and it is also the Tourist Information Centre – it also has the benefit of a small coffee shop with food plus the "convenience" of toilets.

There is a bustling market on Friday and Saturday; in the High Street there is a library housed in a building with a colonnaded frontage and they have available free maps of the town which show you various walks that you can make to take in the most interesting aspects of the town; there are also plenty of places to eat.

This concludes the articles on Stamford.


