## **News From The Vicar Of Wigtoft**

I suppose for many of us, the months of September, and October turn our minds towards the season of Harvest. Indeed, our church celebrations on the 12<sup>th</sup> of October mean that we will be singing the hymns that we associate with such occasions. Yet as modern technology becomes more, and more part of our everyday life, I am informed farming too is very different to what it once was.

I look both in our churches, and in museums at the ancient equipment used for thousands of years to plough or sow crops. Visiting the village shows, the machinery now on display perhaps bears little resemblance to the old manual, and horse drawn equipment. The seasons too vary, as crops are harvested at all kinds of times, and in so many changing ways.

Perhaps it is too easy to just dismiss this time of year as an old observance no longer relevant to our modern way of existence. Yet I somehow can't stop thinking that no observance at all means that we lose something of our thankfulness for our daily living. To give thanks in whatever way we feel is appropriate, which for me is summed up in that wonderful harvest hymn 'all good gifts around us are sent from heaven above, then thank the Lord, 0 thank the Lord, for all his love.

#### Where Hope Grows: Footprints Academy, Kenya

As school children across the UK return to classrooms this term- some with crisp uniforms, packed lunches, and familiar routines, it's worth pausing to reflect on how education looks elsewhere in the world. In one small corner of coastal Kenya, children wake before sunrise and walk up to 5 kilometers each morning, often in blazing heat or heavy rain, just to reach school. And yet, they arrive smiling.

This is *Footprints Academy*, the education arm of *The Footprints Family*, founded by Kerry Watson almost 17 years ago, and supported by a dedicated team. A UK-registered charity, Footprints was established to care for orphaned and vulnerable children - offering not just shelter, but a future.



Footprints Academy, developed within the grounds of the home, providing a place where children can access quality learning in a loving, faith-filled environment. It's more than a school - it's a lifeline. Pupils begin the day with a simple cup of porridge and gather again at lunchtime for a warm, traditional Kenyan meal of rice, beans, and *sukuma wiki* (kale). Nourishment, both physical and spiritual, is part of the rhythm of daily life.

What began as an act of rescue has become a story of renewal. Under Kerry's compassionate leadership, Footprints walks with its children far beyond the classroom - supporting many well into adulthood as they forge their paths through higher education, training, and employment. Rooted in the belief that every child should be nurtured and cherished, Footprints offers not only care and learning, but lifelong encouragement, dignity, and hope.

The Community RePaint initiative collects unused and leftover paint that would otherwise go to waste and makes it available to local people completely free of charge. Whether you're refreshing a room or tackling a creative project, the store offers a wide variety of paints in different colours and finishes.

# Top 10 Gardening Tips for September and October



#### September

- 1. There's still plenty of life left in the garden and lots of things to do on the planting and sowing front, don't put the garden to bed and hack everything back. Leave your perennials to fade naturally, then the leafy stems will carry on feeding the plant for next year.
- 2. Sew Umbellifers are best sown now because they need a cold period of roughly three months before germinating. Prick them out next February or March and plant them out in April.
- 3. **Plant bulbs** Plant daffodils, alliums and all other bulbs (except tulips)so that develop good root systems. <u>Tulips</u> wait for cooler weather, from the end of October onwards
- 4. Sow Winter Salad Sow winter salads now and grow them in a sheltered place, in a large pot or in the greenhouse as a follow up act for tomatoes.
- 5. Order Peonies for bare-root planting in October.
- 6. Note which perennials need dividing. With wetter winters becoming the norm it's best to divide perennials in spring, but do make a note now of which ones need doing.
- 7. Order bare-root roses
- 8. Ease off Watering and Feeding
- 9. Keep Deadheading
- 10. Tidy your Topiary

#### October

- 1. Care for your lawn by raking or brushing leaves off the grass. Try collecting them in a leaf bag, which will turn them into useful leaf mould. You can also cut the grass for one last time this year. Make that last cut slightly higher to protect the lawn from winter frost.
- 2. Trim hedges so they are crisp and tidy for the winter.
- 3. October's the time for clearing up. Greenhouses, ponds, gutters and water butts may all need cleaning out, wooden garden furniture will need covering or storing for the winter and terracotta pots will need bringing inside.
- 4. Divide herbaceous perennials. Plant some back in the ground; take others to pot up and give away to friends in the spring.
- 5. In the veg patch plant garlic cloves with their pointed ends up, and spaced 10cm apart.
- 6. Plant bulbs for a colourful spring display. Try planting clumps of five or seven bulbs of the same variety through a border for a really effective display.
- 7. Plant out spring bedding and biennials, such as wall-flowers, for spring displays. Pots and hanging baskets can be planted with spring bedding, and teamed with bulbs, grasses, cyclamen and violas for a colourful and textural display.
- 8. 'Plant' prepared hyacinths in vases for winter scent and colour in the house.
- 9. Harvest pumpkins for eating as well as carving.
- 10. Enjoy the apple harvest! Why not visit an apple day in your area, where you can taste local varieties?

# **Recipe of the Month - October**

## Apple Cake with Crunchy Topping

#### **Ingredients**

1½ Braeburn or Bramley apples (about 300g), peeled and cored

225g self-raising flour

1 tsp baking powder

½ tsp ground cinnamon

½ tsp mixed spice

125g butter, plus 25g melted

125g light brown sugar

1 lemon, zested

2 eggs, beaten

2 tbsp demerara sugar

clotted cream or ice cream, to serve



#### **Method**

Heat the oven to gas 4, 180°C, fan 160°C. Grease and base line a 20cm loose-based cake tin.

Cut one apple in half, then slice one of those halves into 8 and set aside. Chop the remaining two halves into small dice.

Sieve the flour, baking powder, cinnamon and mixed spice into a bowl. Rub in the butter. Stir in the sugar, lemon zest and diced apple. Stir in the eggs and mix well.

Spoon the mixture into the tin and level the surface. Arrange the apple slices on the top and brush with the melted butter. Sprinkle over the demerara sugar and bake in the oven for 30-40 mins. Serve warm with clotted cream or ice cream.

**Cllr I Mills:** there has been some plastic fly tipped on Fishmere End. I will report it.

#### **Borough and County Councillors reports.**

**Borough Councillor Cantwell** – Boston Borough Council is using Rural England Prosperity Funding (REPF) to support projects that boost rural businesses and community infrastructure. The council has been allocated £128,779 for 2025/26, which it's dividing equally between community facilities and supporting rural businesses. Boston Borough full Council has agreed to purchase 10 new pod vehicles for food waste collection from April 26 onwards. The Emergency Group will be undertaking Risk Walks around the parishes to identify any issues. The group is planning to work with Parish Councils to create a list of addresses of vulnerable residents. No other data will be collected other than addresses.

#### Clerk's report

Noticeboard update – I am hoping that it now erected and in use.

Cllr Brigham reported fallen branches in the playing field. I arranged for them to be removed at a cost of £50. **UPDATE – now removed.** 

The Annual Audit paperwork is now complete. The required documents have been added to the Website. The Notice of Public Rights has been displayed on the noticeboard today and the dates for inspection are 3.6.25 to 14.7.25. They have also been published on the website. The Certificate of Exemption was sent to the external auditors on the 18.5.25. I have not had confirmation of receipt yet.

Following the last meeting I emailed the grass cutting contractors about the queries on their latest invoice, see copy below:

"Following the meeting of the Parish Council last night, I am writing to raise a couple of points with you. This follows a conversation and messages between me and Julian. Ever since you have cut the grass for us, I have always sent you a document with our requirements when asking you to quote for the coming year. I have attached a copy. The Parish Council have noticed that the alternate cuts of the Wild Life Garden with the schedule requested for the Playing Field is not happening so far this year. Looking at the dates on invoice 13744, both areas have been cut approximately every two weeks. The other point, this time from me and I know Julian is aware of this, is to have the texts to me giving the date the cut happens and which areas have been cut. Our annual budget is set for grass cutting based on the information in the attached document and, as we are spending public money, we have to account for everything we spend against our budget. Finally, one of our Councillors has asked if the paths in the Wildlife Garden could be cut no shorter than approximately 4 inches long. If that is an issue for you, please let me know.

The Parish Council understands that the last few months must have been very difficult for you and hope that you Richard are now much better.

A resolution was passed to pay invoice 13911 and 13744 so I will be making those payments very shortly".

# To confirm the renewal of the Insurance Policy for 1.6.25 to 31.5.26 at a cost of £547.59 with Ecclesiastical (through Clear Councils) at a cost of £547.59 as part of a 3 year deal.

#### **Councillors' Reports**

**Cllr S Baxter** – There are trees overhanging the road from Clover Lane to Church Road which are causing a hazard to drivers turning onto this road from driveways and roads. The clerk commented that she had had a call from a resident about this and had reported it on Fix My Street.

**Cllr S Brigham** – asked for an update on the purchase of the goal nets. The clerk advised that the matter was in hand, just waiting for further information to purchase the correct nets and accessories.

**Cllr I Mills –** the fly tipping he mentioned at the last meeting has been reported. I attended the meeting of the Five Villages Emergency Group. There will be two "Emergency Bags" for each village, one will potentially be stored at the village hall and one with a volunteer resident (ideally a First Responder, if there is one in the village). Up to five volunteers will be needed for each village. There will be a Risk Walk around the village sometime in September or October. **ACTION: Speak to Cllr Cantwell about putting an item in the Newsletter.** 

#### **Borough and County Councillors reports.**

• **County Councillor P Lock** – introduced himself as the new County Councillor for Boston Rural Division which covers Wigtoft. He gave a summary of his current areas of responsibility, which are:

I also support the Exec for IT which is the leader of the council.

Cllr Lock advised the Council about the latest notice about the proposed installation of new pylons by National grid and that there is a new tranche of funding available through the Grass Roots Foundation. ACTION: Councillors asked that the Grass Roots funding be added to the agenda for August as a way of funding the cost of a new roundabout.

#### Clerk's report

The Insurance policy has been renewed and the Certificates of Public Liability and Employers Liability been posted on the website.

Clerk's hours worked – as of today's date (1.7.25), the clerk has worked 1 hour more than the monthly allowance. The cut off point is 15.7.25 which is a further 14 days away. It is very likely that this will reach something like 10 hours extra worked. I believe, as we do not have a meeting in September, I can reduce this significantly by taking TOIL (Time off in Lieu) providing that the Council agrees and no extra unexpected work comes to light.

#### To review the Play Area inspection undertaken by Cllr Collingwood.

The clerk had circulated the report to the Councillors prior to the meeting. There were no new items of concern to discuss other than that the trees will need attention at the right time, there are two dirty benches which are in hand to be cleaned and there is a build up of soil around half of the base of the fence around the toddler area. . ACTION: Clerk to find out when Western Power last trimmed the trees and obtain a quote to remove the excess soil.

Meeting closed at 20:10. Next meeting is on the 4th of August at 19:30 at the Village Hall.

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
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
