Topical Talk

Did you enjoy the long, hot, dry summer that we have just had?. If the reports are to be believed it was the hottest summer on record – even hotter than that of 1976. I remember that year particularly well as I had taken on the job of mowing the churchyard at Swineshead, which was very overgrown – this was before the days of strimmers and could only be done by the old method, mowing by scythe. Myself and George Reed, who was retired but helped me out when he could, carried out the task, but found that we had to make an early start in the morning and pack up around lunch time – it just got too hot to do that type of work in the afternoon. Mowing in a churchyard was never easy due to all the grave stones "getting in the way", we were forever breaking the points on our blades as we hit the stonework. Thank goodness for strimmers – you lose less "sweat" with them and they do a better job.

This leads me on to an article that I have read recently about weather conditions in Australia. They have suffered their worst drought in decades and wild animals and birds are heading towards towns and cities in a hungerfuelled mass migration – herds of camels are rampaging through wheat fields in Western Australia after walking hundreds of miles in search of food and water; they have never been seen so far south before. Large numbers of kangaroos are are to be seen in the Canberra suburbs, having come from the west where the grass has run out. Further north, large flocks of corellas, a type of cockatoo native to Australia, have flown from the deserts and plains into Sydney's well watered parks and reserves: a manager at Taronga Zoo said he had never seen such large flocks in his life in Sydney - "There's more food in the city and we irrigate lots of sports fields" he said. Towns out in the countryside are warning drivers to be very wary of armies of emus that have taken over parks and gardens. Kerry McKenzie, a wildlife carer who has been travelling near Canberra, said that it was heart breaking to see all the bodies of kangaroos by the roadside where they had been hit by vehicles while foraging.

Meteorologists in Sydney have reported that the city has not had such a sustained dry spell as bad as the current drought since 1928.

I don't think we can complain too much about our weather this year really – at the moment there are no kangaroos grazing the verges and I haven't seen many starving camels recently.

John Ford DFC died recently aged 95. You won't have heard of him – he was born in Wanstead east London in 1922, the fourth of six children. In 1941, at the age of 19, he applied to join the RAF Volunteer reserve – he undertook elementary flying training, and was then sent to Canada for further training and gained his wings in 1943. He was posted to East Kirkby, Lincolnshire with No

57 Squadron as a Lancaster bomber pilot. On the night of Sept 27th 1944, whilst on a bombing mission over Germany, he and his crew were lucky to escape with their lives when their Lancaster took several direct hits from ground fire and an attack by a German fighter. Ford was injured in the leg and his midupper gunner was badly wounded – the aircraft was badly damaged, with one of the engines disabled. Despite the damage Ford was able to bring the plane to bear over the target and dropped his bombs: he brought the plane back over the North Sea where he and his crew considered bailing out – in the event they decided that they should all stay with their wounded comrade and eventually landed the plane at East Kirkby with the five able bodied crew moving around the craft to help to balance it as the craft made its approach – for his actions Ford was awarded the DFC.

He retired from flying in 1958 and set up a car sales business in Bedfordshire, which is still active today, being run by family members.

Ford was twice married and had three children with his first wife and three with his second.

Sponsor a tree for this Christmas celebration



September is the month for planting Daffodil and other spring flowering bulbs, the exception being Tulips which are best left until November. They do best in well-drained soil but if like me

you have heavy clay, a layer of grit or sharp sand put under the bulbs helps to stop them rotting and helps them multiply in the following years. If you would like to have bulbs flowering indoors for Christmas, the Daffodil Narcissi "Paper White", Hyacinths and Crocus look lovely in ornamental pots. When buying for indoors look for the prepared indication on the packet and plant now, pot into John Innes No.2 or a soil-less compost or special bulb fibre. Keep them cool and dark at first then put them in a warm light spot in mid-November to hopefully flower at Christmas. They make lovely presents for garden lovers.

Prune tall growing shrubs that are hard pruned in the spring such as Lavatera and Buddleia by half now to reduce damage over the winter.

Gardening for wildlife; leave mature ivy plants unpruned, the flowers provide a valuable late source of nectar for insects and the berries which are pretty anyway are food for many birds who visit our gardens.

Let's hope for a nice October to prune back evergreen shrubs and overgrown deciduous ones, to get ship-shape for winter.

I love the Autumn temperature for working in and think it smells lovely at this time of year outside.

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

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

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Local Worthies

Charles Wesley (1707-1788) & John Wesley (1703-1791)

Charles and his brother John were the founders of Methodism. They were two of the 19 children of Samuel and Suzanne Wesley, of the rectory at Epworth, North Lincs; Samuel was the vicar there. Only 10 of the children lived to maturity. Samuel, besides being a clergyman, was also a poet, but his poor judgement in financial matters led to his being in prison for a time for debt.

Charles was educated at Westminster School and Oxford: it was while he was at Oxford that he and a group of like minded people formed a prayer group – they were often mocked by others as being a "Holy Club" and "Methodists", being methodical in their detailed study of the Bible. After graduating Charles followed his father into the Church in 1735.

Apart from being recognised as the co-founder of Methodism Charles was a prolific hymn writer, having written over 6,000 during his life time.

Late in 1735 Charles and John sailed for America, to Georgia, at the invitation of the Governor there; Charles was appointed Secretary of Indian Affairs and went as chaplain to the garrison and fort at Fort Frederica. Things did not turn out too well for him and he was largely rejected by the settlers. In July 1736 he was appointed as Bearer of Despatches to the colonists, returning to England – he never returned to America.

On May 21st 1738, whilst living in London, he experienced an evangelical conversion (presumably to Methodism): it was after this event that he began writing his hymns and around 1739 he and his brother took to open air preaching. Unfortunately, due to ill health, Charles had to stop his field preaching and travelling by 1756 and he settled down in St Marylebone parish in London and worked there for the rest of his life.

Whilst they were travelling the country preaching the brothers covered vast distances on horse back, moving throughout Scotland, England, Wales and Ireland, with London, Bristol and Newcastle being their main centres.

Charles' wife Sarah, also known as Sally, was the daughter of a wealthy Welsh magistrate who had converted to Methodism. Sarah and Charles moved into a house in Bristol in 1749 (on their marriage): she accompanied the brothers on their preaching journeys throughout Britain.

In 1771 Charles obtained another house in London and moved to this from Bristol.

Of their 8 children, only 3 survived infancy – Charles Junior, Sarah and Samuel. Both Charles Junior and Samuel were organists and composers. Charles Junior spent most of his career as the personal organist to the English Royal Family

and Samuel became one of the most accomplished musicians in the world and is often referred to as the "English Mozart".

Charles was 80 when he died in 1788 – he is buried in Marylebone Churchyard. On his deathbed he insisted that he was still a member of the Church of England.

Quite a few of his hymns are still popular today, among these being "Jesus lover of my Soul", "Hark the Herald Angels sing" and "Love divine all love excelling"...

Ancaster, Lincolnshire

In 1724 the Holbeach born antiquarian William Stukeley wrote about Ancaster, "That in the area of Castle Close, where a dovecote stands, there were many foundations standing above ground surrounded by a ditch and rampart" - sadly, none of these remain today: it is thought that these would have been robbed by local inhabitants to build their houses – many of the older properties in the village no doubt contain stone that was quarried by the Romans and probably re-used several times since.

The village and area around Ancaster has had permanent human settlement since the Iron Age (700 BC) and probably for much longer. Over the years there have been many small excavations and assessments in the area, but no large scale research has been carried out to bring the whole together. Quite a few of the finds in the village have come about when work has started on new buildings and the archaeological remains have been discovered during the initial work.

Remains of Stone Age activity (pre 700 BC) have been found in the form of flint tools and excavations in the 1960's uncovered the remains of a substantial middle Iron Age settlement on the Castle Quarry site and more evidence was uncovered under the modern cemetery. All this shows that when Roman forces reached Ancaster soon after their invasion in 43 AD they would have found a thriving settlement in this area.

The Middle Stone Age relates to a period of around 25,000 – 50,000 years ago. Flints relating to this period have mostly been found in the sand pits to the west of the village – the stone age people, known as Mesolithic people, probably led a nomadic lifestyle, known as hunter-gatherers, and probably stayed in the area on a seasonal basis. A large amount of flints and stone axe heads have been found at Caythorpe, north west of Ancaster.

There are a number of reasons for the village to be a good place for a settlement – there are a number of water sources, a definite must for habitation, which included natural springs, and the Beck, a tributary of the River Slea which, until recently, never dried up: also, the silty soil in the area was fertile and easily drained making it ideal for early farming. But perhaps more importantly is the fact that the village (or town as it was in Roman times) is situated at the junction of a number of ancient trackways which give it a strategic importance, quickly recognised by the Romans as they pushed north – whoever controlled the Ancaster Gap controlled the traffic that passed through it; so it made a natural place for them to build a stronghold. This Roman settlement was to last for the whole time of the Roman occupation of Britain.

Unfortunately there are no written records from those times to shed any light on

the people who lived here. The name Ancaster comes from a Roman word (castrum) which means a Roman stronghold, the whole name of Ancaster means the Roman fort of Anna. There was another Roman fort at Great Casterton in Rutland which, like Ancaster, stood on the Roman road known as Ermine Street. There was a crossing of two Roman roads here – Ermine Street and King Street. Ermine Street was the main thoroughfare for the Romans between London and their main centres of occupation in Lincoln and York.

The development of Ancaster by the Romans was in three stages: firstly there would have been a temporary camp for the soldiers known as a marching camp – this was then succeeded by a more permanent fort with permanent fortifications. In the later years of Roman occupation the fort was abandoned, which left behind a civilian settlement which became the defended Roman town. All remains of Roman and Anglo Saxon occupation are protected as Scheduled Ancient Monuments.

As I have already said, much of Ancaster's ancient history remains undiscovered, the only meaningful excavation to have taken place was in the 1960's and 70's by Nottingham University; most discoveries have been made by accident, such as during new building work. During the 1960's excavations the remains of an Iron Age settlement were uncovered in Castle Quarry – these amounted to the sites of two roundhouses, with the remains of an oven in one of them.

Aerial reconnaissance in 1974 discovered a previously unknown Roman camp covering an impressive area of 28 acres.

In 1980 a new bungalow was being built in Roman Way in the village: during the digging of the foundations the builders uncovered the remains of Roman houses. There were the remains of a mortar floor and the walls still had painted plaster on them. The house appeared to have been a half timbered construction with a stone foundation. A far sadder find came from within the walls and floors of the building where the remains of at least seven babies were found – six of the babies were aged 0-6 months and one was pre-term, so may have been a miscarriage: apparently it was common Roman practise to bury babies in this way.

When digging out a garden pond in 1996 a gentleman in Angel Court in the village found the remains of a stone with a female figure carved into it. The figure was well preserved despite the years underground: she is holding a spear and shield and her hair is piled high in the Roman fashion – she is thought to be Minerva, a Roman goddess and possibly part of a domestic shrine.

IMPORTANT NEWS REGARDING THIS YEAR'S FLU VACCINATION

Dear Patient

Please continue to support your practice by attending the flu clinics as shown below:

NHS England recommends Vaccination from October onwards.

Please do not panic to have your Flu Vaccine, as we continue to vaccinate for Influenza until the end of March 2019.

There are slight changes to the Flu Vaccination this season.

NHS England recommends that we use a new vaccine (Fluad Seqirus) for all patients 65 years and over and to continue to use our usual vaccine for all "at risk" groups including pregnant ladies aged 18 – 65 years.

The delivery schedule for the new vaccine (Fluad Seqirus) is to be staggered over three months which unfortunately disrupts our planned flu clinics. The delivery schedule is to be the same nationwide and all practices are to receive 40% stock in September, 20% October and the final 40% in mid-November. This is a major disruption as the majority of our patients will need the new Fluad Sequirus vaccine.

Please do not worry

We have ordered enough vaccine to cover all our patients, but as this is <u>a</u> <u>national delivery programme</u>, all other Pharmacies and GP practices are in the same position and will only have allotted supplies.

We will be holding TWO clinics at Sutterton Village Hall as in previous years and we look forward to seeing you there again for a Coffee and a slice of cake

- c. his/her principal or only place of work during that twelve months has been in that area; or
- d. he/she has during the whole of those twelve months resided in that area; or
- e. he/she has during the whole of those twelve months resided either in the parish or community or within three miles of it.
