Topical Talk

Have you ever watched swimming or diving on TV and found yourself unconsciously holding your breath? There are some tribal people in Indonesia that are very good at this – they can hold their breath under water for 4 or 5 minutes. This has come about because they are mainly sea faring people who get most of their living from diving, being hunter-gatherers, but doing this at sea.

These are the Bajau, known as Indonesian sea nomads: their houses are constructed on stilts in shallow water and they construct their own boats on which, in some cases, they live. They live almost entirely by hunting at sea – besides being able to hold their breath for long periods, they can also dive to depths of up to 70 metres.

Legend has it that many centuries ago, a beautiful princess was kidnapped and taken out to the Pacific: her father ordered his people to search for her but she was never found – ashamed to return, they stayed at sea, building their houses on stilts and diving for food. Whether there is any truth in the legend is debatable, but there is no doubt that their ability to hold their breath has been developed over a long period and something must have happened to bring this about.

If you are one of the large number of people who enjoy a glass (or two) of cheap South African "plonk", your days of buying this may be numbered. South Africa is in the grip of a drought – so severe that a local entrepreneur is actually working on a scheme to tow large icebergs from the Southern Ocean to the coast of South Africa to use to supplement the water supply.

This drought has caused a 30% drop from the country's grape harvest which coincides with a world shortage of wine and will mean that the price of their wine will start to increase. The country is the eighth largest producer, supplying around 4% of global production. Britons bought an average of 26 bottles per person, at a cost of £5.56 per bottle last year, making us one of the largest importers of wine in the world.

Cape Town has been declared a national disaster area and the city has become the World's first big city to run out of water.

A 65 year old Londoner has become the World's first patient to have a cancerous lung tumour blasted away in a painless pioneering surgery procedure that did not even puncture the skin. The patient recovered immediately without any pain or discomfort and was ready to go home the next day after surgeons at St Barts hospital used GPS-style technology to reach the tumour in her lung without having to resort to cuts, needles or having to puncture the lung itself.

After inserting a catheter through the patient's mouth surgeons were able to use 3D images to guide them to the growth and blast it with a targeted dose of microwave energy – film shows the tumour exploding, much like the target of a missile strike. Doctors have hailed the breakthrough as the beginning of a new era in treatment for previously untreatable lung tumours.

There is no sign of cancer in the patient on follow-up scans since the operation in February but she will continue to be monitored, but at the moment there is no need for further treatment.

The search for the Malaysian airliner that went missing in March 2014 on a flight from Kuala Lumpur to Beijing has become the World's costliest search for a missing aircraft.

There were high expectations recently when a wreck was discovered 12,000 ft down in the Indian Ocean, but on closer examination it turned out to be the wreck of the West Ridge, a 220ft vessel built in Scotland which was lost in 1883 whilst carrying a cargo of coal to India. She was lost with all hands and her whereabouts has been a sea faring mystery until now.

It is a well known fact that these coal-carrying ships were prone to explosions due to the build-up of gasses from their cargo. Between 1878 and 1886 no less than 302 British registered ships with coal cargoes disappeared at sea.

Meanwhile the search for the missing airliner continues. The searchers, an American company, were to be paid \$90 million if they found the aircraft which was lost, along with all 239 people on board.

Wigtoft Church Finances

Following the Parochial Church Council Annual general Meeting in April where the 2017 Church accounts were approved it's time to let you know how we did last year.

2017 and 2018 are exceptional years financially for Wigtoft Church. The Roof Repair Project affects how our finances look because of grants awarded for the project and use of our own funds going towards the costs. The project is still ongoing and once complete we will be able to publish the figures for this.

Firstly, on behalf of the PCC, I would like to thank everyone who has helped raise funds over the year in whatever way. This may be from collections at services, regular donations, one-off donations or support at Church fundraising events. I would also like to thank the Friends of the Church group for all their hard work organising events for the Church and to the ladies of Scraps R Us for their generous donations.

As always we are very careful how these funds are used. We currently have four funds that income from the various sources are allocated to. There is the General Fund that covers our normal day to day running costs. This consists of things like building insurance, electricity, the alarm system, our Parish Share (paid to the Diocese to pay our Vicar etc.) and other general expenses.

We then have the Fabric Fund, for repairs and maintenance of the building. There is also a Churchyard Fund, which pays for maintenance of the Churchyard, this includes tree pruning etc, and in 2017 we had a number of trees that needed either pruning or felling because they were dangerous so our costs here were quite high. The normal maintenance of the churchyard - grass cutting etc. is all done by volunteers so at the moment that does not cost us anything.

In 2017/2018 we also have the Roof Repair Fund to pay for the work currently being done on the roof. Funded by grants, donations and our own funds.

Defibrillator

We now have a defibrillator in Wigtoft for use in medical emergencies. This has been funded by Scania and The Dragon Boat Race Charity for the village. It is located outside the Village Hall just to the right of the entrance door (it's that big yellow box!)

A defibrillator is a device that gives a high energy electric shock to the heart through the chest wall to someone who is in cardiac arrest. This high energy shock is called defibrillation, and it's an essential life saving step in the chain of survival. If you come across someone who has had a cardiac arrest, it's vital to call 999 and start CPR.



Instruction on how to use the device are on the box. But basically you have to call 999, the operator will assess the situation and if they feel that use of the defibrillator is necessary they will give you a code to unlock the door of the cabinet, you can then take the machine to the patient and the 999 operator will give you instructions on what to do to use it.

Hopefully no one will need to use this machine, but at least we know that it is there in an emergency.



Sam Snail's Jobs In The Garden

What a wonderful bank holiday for the weather, it ignited the plants and trees like a firework. Instead of being delayed I think every type of plant is ahead now with blossom bursting

everywhere. Think about putting in supports for tall perennials like Delphiniums, Gladioli, Verbascum and even Lupins, while the ground is soft enough to push canes or sticks well down into the soil. If you are growing Clematis or Sweet peas, tie them to their supports regularly, as they soon become a tangle.

You can lift and divide overgrown daffodil bulb clumps when the leaves have died down, but re-plant them immediately while the soil is still dampish.

In the vegetable garden harvest established Rhubarb by pulling, not cutting, taking no more than half at any one time. Newly planted crowns are best left for the first year to establish well. Put supports in place for climbing beans, harden off greenhouse grown plants for a couple of weeks or plant bean seeds directly in the ground.

If you grow late flowering herbaceous perennials such as Golden Rod, Michaelmas Daisies and Sedums, to spread the flowering, give them the Chelsea chop now (halve the height of them) it also stops them flopping and become bushier.

You know the old saying. "So much to do and so little time", well that sums May up well I think...

The Blisbury Charity

This charity was created by William Blisbury for the education of poor children in Wigtoft.

Not a great deal is known about the personal circumstances of this benefactor but it can be assumed that he was involved in farming as that was the principal local industry at the time.

The first recorded school in Wigtoft was the one that was endowed by Blisbury in his will of 1714. It is thought that this was held, in the first instance, in the church, as a record of 1790 states "Great inconvenience having arisen from using the vestry as a school, the trustees of Mr William Blisbury's charity have expended £30 in repairing and fitting up a school room". The vicar gave one guinea and the parishioners seven guineas towards the expenses.

In his will Blisbury also left two cottages, along with their yards, and stipulated that the rents from these was to be used for the education of poor children in Wigtoft. At the time, one cottage was tenanted by a Mr Thomas Millington and the other by Thomas Hatchet. There is no indication of where these cottages were located, but possibly one of these may have been the old "Golden Fleece" pub, as it has a plaque on its facade with Blisbury Charity written on it.

In a report from 1837 it is stated that the school in Wigtoft was for the teaching, free, of reading English and writing to the poor children of the parish – these children being from parents who were paying less than £10 per annum rent; 18 children fell into this category, though for arithmetic they had to pay. There were about 20 paying scholars. At this time the charity income was £48-14-6 per annum, but this was subject to a deduction of £15 pa for interest on debt for re-building the houses.

At the Enclosure of the fens in 1773, 9 acres of land were allotted to the charity – this land is in the Fenhouses and is still part of the charity.

A new school was built in 1830 by public subscription; this was finally closed in the 1970's when a new school was built in Sutterton. The school building was sold and the proceeds invested by the charity – this also happened when the Golden Fleece was sold; it was bought by Bateman's Brewery many years ago.

The funds provided by this charity are available each year to help pupils and scholars of the parish of Wigtoft to further their education, subject to the approval of the trustees.



John Foxe was born in Boston (Lincs) in 1516 – he was a clergyman and author and was also a Puritan. As an author he is best known for his book entitled "Foxe's Book of Martyrs".

His father died when he was young and his mother re-married. He was educated at Oxford where he became proficient in the Hebrew language. Whilst he was at college he became embroiled in a religious web, going against some of the religious beliefs held at the time. He had been expected to take Holy Orders and become a priest, but he resigned from his post because of his opposition to celibacy, likening it to "self castration". Foxe's religious beliefs led to a break in his relationship with his step-father, and may even have put his life in danger. He personally witnessed the execution of a man called William Cowbridge in September 1538; he had been accused of heresy and was burnt at the stake.

Having abandoned what had been a promising academic career, Foxe fell upon hard times. One day, starving and hopeless, he was sitting in St Pauls church when a stranger sat down beside him and put a large sum of money into his hands – this stranger told him to be of good courage, for in a few days time God would give him a more certain future: he never knew who the stranger was but not long after he was hired as a tutor by the Duchess of Richmond. It was around this time that he married Agnes Randall (Feb 1547) and they had six children.

He spent several years in Europe where he went to escape from some of the controversy that his religious opinions created. He was never rich, but he was often poor, often penniless. He eventually returned home but always seemed to be involved in religious controversy.

In 1563 he was appointed Prebend of Shipton in Salisbury Cathedral; in other words he received a kind of pension or income from this: he retained this position until his death.

Foxe died in April 1587 – his widow Agnes died in 1605. their son Samuel prospered after his father's death and accumulated a substantial estate. He saved his father's manuscripts and these are now in the British Library.





Lincoln Cathedral - Part 5

St Hugh of Avalon (1140-1200)

St Hugh was one of the most influential men to have been connected with the cathedral – he reigned as Bishop from 1186 until his death in 1200. he was a French nobleman, a Benedictine and Carthusian monk and a Catholic and finally an Anglian saint being canonized in 1220. In his lifetime the new cathedral at Lincoln, of magnificent proportions, was begun and was very far advanced when he died and he was buried within it. Legends have been built around his friendship with a swan at Stow and after his sainthood was bestowed on him he became the patron saint of swans.

A shrine was erected to him within the cathedral, but was lost when Henry VIII's men destroyed it in 1540 at the time of the Reformation.

The Cathedral Bells

There are a total of 20 bells in the cathedral towers: in the south west tower there are 13 while the north west tower contains 2 more. In the central tower there are a further 5, which includes Great Tom, its largest bell and the one that strikes hourly. Great Tom is accompanied by a quarter hour striking clock which was installed in the 19th century. Great Tom was lifted into the tower in 1834: 2 further bells which were donated were lifted into place in 1880.

The Font

The font in the cathedral is what is known as a Tournai font. It was shaped from a solid block of blue black Tournai limestone, known as tournai marble and quarried in Flanders. It has been dated to the mid 12th century, meaning that it survived the earthquake of 1115. It weighs around 2 metric tonnes.



The Organ

There has been an organ of some kind in the cathedral since the 14th century. In St Hugh's Choir within the building there is a depiction of an angel playing a portable organ and this is dated to around 1370. Cathedral accounts from 1311 and 1442 mention fees for cleaning or setting up a new organ. The present one (a Willson) was first erected in 1826 and enlarged and improved in subsequent alterations, notably by "Father" Henry Willis in 1898. This was

Willis' last cathedral organ before his death in 1901. It has undergone two restorations, in 1960 and 1998, by Harrison and Harrison. A Lincoln industrialist, Alfred Shuttleworth donated £1,000 towards the cost of the new organ in 1898, which is the equivalent of £100,000 today.

The Services Chapels

There are three Services chapels located within the cathedral – one to each of the fighting services. The idea grew after the first world war, the Regimental Chapel of the Lincolnshire Regiment being the first. In 1923 two further chapels were dedicated to airmen and seamen. In 1946 all three were redecorated and dedicated as Services Memorial Chapels.

The Soldier's chapel contains the Books of Memory of the $10^{\rm th}$ Foot, which became the Lincolnshire Regiment and finally the $2^{\rm nd}$ Battalion, The Royal Anglian Regiment.

The Seamen's chapel has glass depicting famous early Lincolnshire settlers and explorers of the US and Australia, among them being Capt. John Smith, George Bass, Matthew Flinders and Sir Joseph Banks. There is a model of HMS Investigator in which Matthew Flinders charted the Australian coast.

The Airmen's chapel contains 4 impressive stained glass windows, made between 1953 and 1966. There are also overseas memorials, the Books of Remembrance of Groups 1 and 5 Bomber Command and 9 Training Command, with over 25,000 names.

Robert Grosseteste 1175 - 1253

Robert Grosseteste became Bishop of Lincoln in 1235. He was a peasant's son from Suffolk who rose from his humble beginnings to become a scholar, a theologian, a mathematician, a philosopher and a would-be saint. He is reported to have had a sharp tongue and at one time had chastised the King. During his lifetime he was a lecturer at Oxford and was also appointed Chancellor of the University of Oxford.

After his death in 1253 he was venerated as a saint but Rome refused the canonization. His tomb in the cathedral was destroyed in the Civil War. The present tomb is a reasonably new one and was dedicated in 1953.

The cathedral, and indeed the castle, are both open to the public most days and there is a car park adjacent to the castle wall, so there is minimal walking. Charges apply and there is refreshments available in both.
